August, 1813

At a meeting held at Hopewell meeting house on the second Friday of August, 1813. Samuel Wilie was chosen chairman. The meeting was constituted with prayer by David McQuiston.

John Patterson, Richard Sloan, Andrew McQuiston, John Wilie and Hugh Patterson were elected a committee to form a Constitution, which was done & was adopted.

John Patterson, Samuel Wilie, John Ramsey, Hugh Mc-Quiston and James Brown were elected Trustees for one year.

A vote was taken & carried that six dollars be laid on each seat for the present year commencing this day to pay (for) supplies* and create a fund for the use of the Congregation. Concluded with prayer by John Patterson.

*"supplies" meant a minister

April 2, 1814

At a meeting held at Hopewell meeting house on the 2nd day of April, 1814 at which time the Rev. Mr. Porter preached, the following subscriptions was taken. We the subscribers of Hopewell Congregation promise to pay the sums annexed to our respective names to be appropriated for the purpose of obtaining the labors of the Rev. Alexander Porter amongst us.

*NOTE: Herewith follows a list of 50 men and women, all heads of households. The women are all widows. These records have been cut out of the Session Book and are among loose papers in Miami Univ. Library for Special Collections.

THE HISTORY

OF

HOPEWELL CHURCH

from the church records

In the years 1806 and 1807 several families, members of the Associate Reformed church, emigrated from the states of Kentucky and South Carolina and settled in the county of Montgomery (now Preble).' In the summer of 1807 Mr. Risk favoured them with a sermon at the house of Wm. McCreary.

In 1808 they formed themselves into a society and in conjunction with the people of Concord petitioned the Presbytery of Kentucky for supplies ("supplies" means a minister) and in the month of Sept. Mr. Craig preached at the house of David McDill and organized the congregation.

Ruling elders were at the same time nominated and chosen by the congregation, namely, David McQuiston, John Patterson, Andrew McQuiston, James Boyse and Ebenezer Elliott, all of whom had been formerly ordained.

They continued to get some supplies of sermon from the Kentucky Presbytery and their numbers increased by emigation from different states, but a prospect of having a minister settled among them never opened until in the year of 1814 when the Rev. Mr. Alex. Porter, pastor of the A. R. Church at Cedar Springs, Abbeville, S. Car. came on a visit to the Western churchs and at this place preached two Sabbaths and one week day.

At this time the congregation had increased to about 50 families who shortly presented a call for yearly salary for 2/3 of his ministerial labors, and also the congregations of Hamilton and Concord for 1/3 of his ministerial labors, \$166.66 2/3 with the understanding that as soon as the latter congregation could be otherwise provided for, the former would get the whole of his labors. In Oct. 1814 Mr. Porter with his family came to his new pastoral charge at Hopewell. In July following, shortly after Mr. Porter's coming, the congregation was much enlarged by emigrations from S. Car. and six members were added to the session who had been formerly members of session in Carolina.

*From the records of Ila Ramsey Lemon: "The six new members of session were probably William Magaw, Nathan Brown, John Pressly, John Giles, John Pinkerton and Alexander Hamilton."

HISTORIC HOPEWELL, Inc.

A brochure tells the story of the building of this Hopewell Church in 1825 by Christians who "put first things first." They built it straight and strong with beauty in its simplicity,

The early Ohio Settlers worshipped here for 90 years. After its closing in 1915, an annual Homecoming was held on the last Sunday in August. This was discontinued in 1958. The fate of the old building was uncertain until 1964 when a group of interested people with the help of Rev. Donald Grady of the Fairhaven U. P. Church, Rev. John Britcher of the Morning Sun U. P. Church, Rev. Leslie Van Inwegen of the Oxford Seminary Church, Rev. Harvey Luce of the General Presbytcrian Church in Dayton and legal assistance from Attorney Ernest Kruse of Dayton, formed an interdenominational organization.

William Simpson suggested the name "Historic Hopewell" and it was incorporated. It was their vision and belief that the building could again shelter and inspire worshipping people. The plan was not to take members from their own churches, but to provide a place of worship, where vacationers in Hueston Woods State Park could come, dressed casually during the summer months.

The first service was held May 31, 1964, at 8:45 A.M. with Rev. John Britcher speaking to 12 people in the east church yard.

That afternoon at 3:00, a meeting was held to incorporate the interdenominational, non-profit organization. Elected officers were as follows:

Mrs. Glenn Wright was appointed Statutory Agent but withdrew due to ill health and Mrs. Marion Crowell took her place.

Letters were sent out to inform friends and the services were publicized.

The meetings were held outside for two summers. Chairs, song books, and the Boy Scout's lectern from the Morning Sun U. P. Church was carried "out and in" by willing hands. Rev. Van Inwegen brought a small portable organ from the Oxford Seminary Church which was used in the outdoor services.

The blessings of beautiful weather, singing of the birds, buzzing of the bees and the fluttering butterflies were enjoyed by those attending in camping clothes at this quiet, peaceful spot.

The services were informal but inspiring and reverent. Children sat quietly on chairs or on blankets. The congregation sang joyously and sometimes a camper played the organ or led the singing. One Sunday A.M., when there was no speaker, a minister who was camping volunteered and a Boy Scout played the organ.

Offerings were generous, the speakers volunteered their service as did all workers. Gifts were sent in by friends, making it possible to repair and clean the church. Everyone who looks inside is inspired with its simplicity, strength and beauty Services moved inside in 1966. More gifts were received, song books from Rev. and Mrs. Grady, folding chairs and a \$50 donation from Fairhaven Grange, a large cupboard from Fairhaven School, an outside toilet from Fairhaven U. P. Church, an American Flag which had flown over our capitol in Washington, D.C., from Mr. and Mrs. Beecher Hess of Morning Sun, and hymnals from Oxford Methodist Church.

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The committee was grateful to Mr. Maynard Dils, manager of Hueston Woods State Park for signs and patrol service to Israel Township, for grass mowing and repair to culvert by Mr. Earl Parks. Rev. Harvey Luce mimeographed letters, Homer and Opal Tingle announced our services each week on their radio broadcast. The local papers, The Oxford Press, Palladium-Item of Richmond, and The Preble County News gave interesting coverage.

Mr. Ted Johnson set the R.E.A. electric pole in the church yard. Mr. Dwight Tuttley fixed the foundation and pointed up the bricks. Mrs. Glenna Simpson found a discarded church bulletin board in Eaton on which Mr. Marvin Somers printed a short history of the church

Mrs. Mabel Simpson prepared material for the brochure about the Hopewell Church from 1805 to 1958. Thousands of these brochures have been given at the Sunday Services, placed in the Lodge, park offices, and many other places.

Gifts of money and collections have been generous, speakers, musicians and many workers have given their time to improve the grounds and building. It is not possible to give all the names but all who have helped in any way feel this is a worthwhile project.

The organ has been played by many. The messages have been brought by 39 speakers, many of whom took charge several times during the past six months.

Youth groups from Oxford Methodist Church, Morning Sun U. P. Church, Fairhaven U. P. Church, Bethany Methodist, Lutheran Youths from Riemond, Indiana, area, a group from Dayton and several Boy Scout groups have assisted in giving the services and helping greatly in the clean up work.

At least 30 denominations from all over the U.S., Canada, France, India, Sweden, England and the Republic of South Africa have been recorded in the guest register.

All officers were re-elected until 1968 when Mrs. Dwight Tuttley replaced Mrs. Glenna Simpson as recording secretary and treasurer.

After 8 years, the annual Homecoming was revived in August, 1966.





Historic Hopewell

In the years 1806 and 1807, several families, most of whom were of Scotch-Irish descent and members of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, opposed to slavery, left their homes in South Carolina and immigrated to Israel Township, Preble County, Ohio.

These people held church services in their homes at first, and in 1808 built the first Hopewell Church building of logs, 30 by 30 feet. The name was chosen because many of the settlers came from Hopewell, S. C. Services were held without a regular pastor until 1814 when Dr. Alexander Porter left his charge at Abbesville, S. C., accept a call to this church.

In the six years before the first pastor was installed, the church had grown such that 30 more feet were added to the original length of the building. The congregation then outgrew its 30 by 60 foot log church. According to church records of November 15, 1825, members of the congregation promised to pay a certain amount, half in money and half in produce, to the trustees of the church for the purpose of erecting a larger building. One hundred and sixteen people, heads of families, pledged to pay \$1,003.

The brick was made and burned in a kiln near the front of the church. The floor was paved with brick, everyone paving under his own pew. The men of the church did most of the labor, erecting a church 45 by 70 feet of Scotch architecture. The pulpit was in the middle of the West wall, five feet or more above the floor with a small window on each side. The main door was in the middle of the East side with a smaller door and two windows at each end of the church.


By 1834, the congregation had increased until it was too large for the building and the pastoral care of one minister. At that time, arrangements were made for building a new meeting place at Fair Haven where members from the North organized a new congregation. The church continued to be so crowded that as soon as word was received that a family was moving from the area, another family would immediately seek to purchase their pew. The peak membership of the church was around 400, which number did not include any children under the age of 12. In 1837, three years after the Fair Haven Church was formed, members living near Oxford formed a church there. Twelve years later, in 1849, College Corner families built a church there. In 1876, 100 members from Hopewell joined with the former Beech Woods Reformed Presbyterian Church to erect a new building for the Morning Sun United Presbyterian Church.

About 1880, "Old Hopewell," now surrounded by the four new churches, was less crowded and at that time was completely overhauled and refurbished. The pulpit which hung on the West wall was removed and placed at the North end of the building. The main entrance, formerly opposite the pulpit, was changed to two doors at the South end. A vestibule was taken off the South end. A wooden floor was installed and a carpet placed which was sewn together by the women of the church. Some windows were enlarged and some at the end of the church were closed and the walls were papered. An interesting feature of "Old Hopewell" was a bench placed at the left side of the church specifically for any Negroes who might be passing through the area and desiring to worship. This area was a station on the underground railroad.

After the formation of the four daughter-churches and through deaths and removals, the congregation became weakened. The last minister was Dr. W. Edward Paxton who served from 1904 to 1915 when regular services were discontinued. A few years later, summer meetings or "homecomings," were held the last Sabbath of August every year until 1958 which was the 150th Anniversary of the establishment of the Hopewell congregation. It is hoped that these homecomings can be resumed.

Early names appearing in the records are Bell, Boyse, Brown, Caldwell, Douglass, Elliott, Gilmore, Hamilton, Herron, McDill, McGaw, McMillan, McCreary, McQuiston, Patterson, Paxton, Pinkerton, Ramsey, Simpson, Steale, Tuttley and Wright.

In the cemetery adjoining the church, both the first and last pastors of the church are buried. The first pastor, Rev. Alexander Porter (1770-1836), was born in South Carolina and served the church from 1814 to 1833. The last pastor, Rev. W. E. Paxton (1856-1952), was born in Israel Township, Preble County, Ohio, and served the church from 1904 to 1915. Seven other ministers served between the years 1863 and 1904.

Jan. 28th 1839

1:

Trustees elected: John Ramsey, Jr., John Graham, David McQuiston, Jr., Robert Madill and Thomas C. Madill.

Jan. 27th 1840

Moved by E. Elliott, 2nded by James Boyse, that the Rev. S. W. McCracken be paid as a stated supply until Jan. 1st 1840, at which time his salary will commence. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the money in the hands of the Treasurer of the Education Society be paid to the Oxford Theological Seminary, provided the members of Fairhaven agree. Carried.

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Jan. 25th 1841

Committee appointed to attend to the doors of the Meeting House to conduct strangers to seats. Committee; Samuel Paxton, John Graham, Samuel Bell, Robert McDill. Committee appointed on ways and means to raise money: Rev. S. W. McCracken, Nathan Brown, Esq., Samuel Paxton, James Brown and Dr. McDill.

Jan. 31st 1842

Moved by D. McQuiston & 2nded by Hugh Elliott that Archibald Martin be chosen Singing Clerk to fill the vacancy made by resignation of Joseph McQuiston. Carried.

Trustees authorized to procure the first seat on the left of the south door for the use of <u>colored persons</u> when they come to the house of God, and that the congregation consider it their duty to encourage colored persons to attend on the ordinances of God's House.

Jan. 30th 1843

Trustees appointed: S. B. Graham, Andrew Hamilton, Matthew Wilson, James Brown, Jr. and Robert Paxton.

Collection to be taken for repairing the grave yard, purchasing tools for same and to purchase the seat voted at a previous meeting for the use of colored persons.

January, 1844

Moved and seconded that Wm. Wilson's title to his seat remain untouched. Carried. Moved & seconded that James McDill, Wm. Willson, Robert Rock, D. Madill & Nathan Sloan be requested to assist the singing clerk. Carried.

Resolved that the trustees inform the owners of seats who are now in other congregations and endeavor to get their consent that the seats may be set up and sold to the highest bidder and the proceeds of the sale be returned to the owner.

Mar. 25th 1844

Special meeting. Resolution offered concerning the sale of seats owned by non-members of Hopewell, (Those who had been members and had gone on to other congregations) that the seats be sold to the highest bidder, owners receive what they had paid for seats, surplus to go to the use of the congregation. If seats do not bring first cost, owner to receive what the seats sell for.

Nathan Brown, Esq. objected, offered the resolution that "a committee be appointed to investigate existing regulations of seats in the meeting house and their operation and to report regulations for their future proposal". Carried.

Committee: Nathan Brown, Esq., Hugh Elliott, Ebenezer Elliott, Robert Paxton, Esq. & John Graham. N. Brown & Mr. Cramer appointed to "make a draft of the eavetroughs and probable expense of putting up the same".

May 15th 1844

Seat business settled by the following resolution offered by N. Brown, Esq., "that all seats now vacant or may hereafter become vacant, be sold according to the original articles of sale. Adopted.

June 15th 1844

"Mrs. Gillespie entitled to hold her seat during her membership in the congregation." All persons owning seats purchased since the original sale of seats to hand in to the Clerk the number of pew and price paid, also from whom purchased, to report within ninety days.

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Feb. 5, 1845 Amendment:

Resolved that on all seats that have been or may be relinguished to the Trustees, the reduction on the seats shall be from the original sale, at 50¢ per year, and any persons, members and supporters in the congregation with family sufficient to fill it, may, according to the original articles of sale, have any vacant pew by applying to the Trustees and paying such sum, if any, as may have been paid to a former owner for its redemption. Such applicants shall be supplied according to the order of application.

Trustees elected: Joseph McQuiston, John Herron, John Sloan, Samuel Buck and A. McQuiston. Trustees to fix the stoves, and procure and set out a suitable number of shade trees in the church yard.

Mr. (Rev.) McCracken requested to attend the Sabbath Convention to be hold<u>en</u> at Upper Springfield in April next and that his expenses be paid out of the contingent fund.

Jan. 26, 1846

Same Trustees elected. The Trustees authorized to whitewash and <u>scour-out</u> the church.

The Trustees authorized to issue a subscription for the purpose of putting in a new <u>pulpit</u>. Ebenezer Pinkerton, agent for Robt. Pinkerton, presented a claim for the sale money of seat No. 34. Allowed the redemption price of the seat No. 34 according to award of the committee of Presbytery.

Jan. 25, 1847

Trustees elected: James Brown, Jr., David McQuiston, Sr., Joseph Cramer, John Graham and William Gray. The treasurer authorized to collect dues and borrow the <u>deficit</u> necessary to defray the expenses of the congregation for the past year.

Jan. 31, 1848

The treasurer & clerk having resigned, David McDill was elected in his stead. The former minutes were kept by Hugh Elliott.

Jan. 29, 1849

Moved by Joseph McQuiston and 2nd by Ebenezer Elliott that "Whereas the people belonging to this congregation in the vicinity of College Corner are desirous of a seperate organization and in doing so do not wish to lose their right to hold their seats in Hopewell, therefore,

Resolved that they have the privilege of holding their seats until they obtain the stated ordinances by continuing to be supporters here." Carried.

Moved by David McQuiston that the congregation dispense with giving out the line in conducting the praises of God in said congregation. Carried.

Also moved and carried that should the foregoing resolution upon trial not prove satisfactory, the session are hereby authorized to instruct the clerk to return to the former practice.

(1) John Brown, (2) Hugh McQuiston and (3) Thomas Mc-Quiston appointed singing clerks. Trustees authorized to purchase as much ground on the east side of the Meeting House lot as may think necessary for the convenience of the congregation. (for stables)

Trustees instructed to learn the cost of different kind of fencing suitable for enclosing the grave yard and report at a future meeting. David McDill, Clerk

Feb. 2, 1850

On motion of John Simpson and Hugh McDill decided to take up a new subscription for the salary of the pastor Mr. McCracken. This sub. to be presented, by the mem-

bers of session, to all the male members of the congregation, and others in their respective <u>quarters</u>. Also when presenting the subscription they call on those in arrears on the old subscriptions for settlement. Moved by Nathan Brown & David McQuiston that a committee of five be appointed to examine the condition of the Meeting House and fences around the yard & grave yard and estimate repairs.

John Sloan, John Graham, John Simpson, David McQuiston and Hugh McDill, said committee. These men also appointed Trustees for the year. William Gray, appointed collector of the Minister's salary.

Resolved that the tax received on seats for the payment of land adjoining the Meeting House not be refunded to the persons who paid it.

Moved by David McQuiston & John Simpson that a new pulpit be put in the Meeting House, provided money can be obtained by subscription.

Moved by William Gray, 2nd by John Graham that the congregation hereafter dispense with giving out the line in conducting the praises of God.

May 25, 1850

Committee on repairs reported the Meeting House roof had been repaired, and the present fencing with repairs would last a few years longer. A tax of one dollar was laid on each pew levied to meet the expense.

Jan. 27, 1851

Wm. Gray appointed Trustee in the place of Hugh McDill who declined serving another year. The other former Trustees reelected.

A tax of two dollars per levied to pay expense of repairing about the grave yard, etc. Resolved that contributions from persons not belonging to this congregation for use in repairing about the grave yard would be thankfully received and used for that purpose.

Jan. 26, 1852

The Trustees reported that \$75 were needed to defray cost of repairs during the year. Tax of one dollar and a half levied on each pew. Trustees elected were Joseph G. McQuiston, Wm. McCreary, Henry Marshall, Nathan Sloan and D. McQuiston, Jr. On motion, James McDill was elected singing clerk.

Jan. 31, 1853

Trustees of last year continued. Trustees authorized to repair stoves or buy new ones as they may think best. Resolved to take a subscription to pay for new stoves and painting the seats.

Andrew McClenahan was elected singing clerk of the congregation. David McDill resigned office of Clerk and Treasurer of the congregation and Joseph Brown was elected.

David McDill, Clerk

Jan. 31, 1854

David McQuiston, Sr., John Sloan, J. G. McQuiston, Robert Wilson & John Graham were elected Trustees.

The trustees authorized to paint the pews, whitewash the house outside and inside and make new tables and seats for sacrimental purpose. Moved & carried that a committee of five be appointed to assess the property of male members, and levy a tax on property so assessed sufficient to cover incidental expenses. Moved & carried that the trustees make a statement of the amount needed for repairs. (Levying tax on pews seems to be unpopular as one motion to that effect was withdrawn and another lost.)

Hugh Elliott was elected Treasurer of the Minister's Salary. A committee of five appointed to frame resolutions in relation to raising the Salary.

The committee recommended that each elder be authorized to circulate a subscription paper in his respective

quarter and raise as much as he can. Adopted. The recommending committee consisted of John Graham, A. Hamilton, J. Simpson, J. G. McQuiston and Samuel Buck. Joseph Brown, Clk.

June 3, 1854

David McQuiston, Sr. moved and seconded by J. Simpson that the pulpit be removed to the North end of the church and be remodeled and that the seats be changed to suit.

David Ramsey added to the motion that there be one door in the North end. This was accepted by the original mover. Yea's 18; Nay's 8.

Moved by J. Simpson, and by J. G. McQuiston that the trustees be authorized to cut off a <u>vestibule</u> off the South end of the church. Carried.

A committee of three appointed to act in place of the elders in raising the salary. Wm. Gray, John Graham and Hugh Elliott. Carried. Motion made by John Ramsey, Sr. 2nded by John Simpson. Joseph Brown, Clk.

Aug. 4, 1854

At this meeting all the resolutions passed at the last meeting, June 3, 1854, were rescinded and all the proceedings of the Annual Meeting, Jan. 31st 1854, were rescinded.

Moved by John Simpson & 2nd by Thos. McQuiston that the instructions to the trustees be reinstated and that they be further instructed to enlarge the windows, Carried.

Dec. 3, 1854

Moved by James McCreary, 2nd by Hugh McQuiston that the seats be sold to defray expenses of repairs. To be set up at from 10 to 14 dollars according to length and situation.

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Moved by Robt. Paxton, 2nd by Henry Marshall that the foregoing motion be amended by declaring the seats free and that the money for repairs be raised by subscription. Also that a committee of seven be appointed to assign each family their place of sitting, having respect to their convenience and wishes. The amendment as substituted carried. Ayes 40; Noes 17.

Carried that the assignment of seats be made today. The members of the appointed committee were John Buck, Robt. Patterson, Henry Marshall, Hugh Elliott, Joseph Stuart, J. G. McQuiston and David Ramsey.

Whereupon the meeting went into extrajudiciate conference for the purpose of choosing and appropriating seats. The above committee agreeing that members should choose their own seats and that they would act only on conflicting claims. D. M. McDill, Clk pro tem.

Jan. 27, 1855

Same trustees continued. Trustees authorized to build a wood house.

Mr. McCracken requested to state at each annual meeting the amount of salary he has received the past year.

On motion of J. G. McQuiston & Wm. Douglass, it was resolved to present the subscription papers for the minister's salary to the young men and request them to contribute to the support of the Pastor. Resolved that the congregation should give Mr. McCracken \$600 per year and that means be taken to raise that amount.

James Brown and Hugh Elliott being unwell, James Brown and Robert Paxton were appointed in their place on the committee to raise the Minister's Salary.

Jan. 28th 1856

The Trustees reported the amount expended in repairing the house, expense cancelled and a balance of cash on hand of \$2.75, subscr. 5.00.

The trustees authorized to obtain the old saddle house for a wood house. Moved and seconded that the balance on hand of building fund be donated to John Graham for services rendered.

Committee on Pastor's Salary reported a subscription of \$619. Pastor reported that he had received in 1854 \$554.50. Resolved to take a subscription for the Synod, Missionary and Tract Society, etc. Joseph Brown was appointed Treasurer of said fund.

Trustees for the following year, Hugh Elliott, Samuel Graham, James McDill, Nathan Sloan and John Wallace. Joseph Brown, Clerk

Jan. 26th 1857

Trustees report that having failed to get the saddle house for a wood house, they agreed to build a new one and contracted with James R. H. Bernard to build one for ______ dollars and owing to the difficulty of getting lumber sawed, it remained in an unfinished state.

The sexton authorized to close up the door in the North end of the Meeting house in the fall and keep it closed until Spring. Moved by John Simpson that a committee of five be appointed to dispose of the wood house and to make arrangement to build a wood and session house in connection with the Trustees of the Township. Committee appointed were John Simpson, D. McQuiston, H. Elliott, Wm. Gray and James McDill. Trustees of last year continued for another year.

The committee of five reported a resolution that the Trustees of Hopewell Congregation be instructed to confer with the Township Trustees to build a house jointly but should they not agree then the Trustees of Hopewell take measures to build a house. This was accepted, then reconsidered, and the original question was again put and carried.

Hugh Elliott reported on the Pastor's Salary. By deaths, removals & otherwise \$59.00 less than last year. Added to by new subscriptions \$13.00 leaving a loss of \$46.00.

The congregation was therefore instructed to raise their subscriptions about one fourth and elders be requested

to hand around the subscription in their respective quarters. Carried that the congregation fall back on the old way of <u>securing</u> <u>seats</u>.

On motion of John Simpson the trustees were authorized to purchase a <u>sofa</u> and <u>one</u> <u>dozen chairs</u>. A collection was to be taken up to pay for chairs, sofa and sexton. Joseph Brown, Clerk

Jan. 25th 1858

Trustees continued another year. Elders requested, to present the subscription paper to the young men over 21 years or to give their names to some proper person who would do it.

Hugh Elliott was requested to make a full report of the Pastor's salary at the next Annual meeting. The trustees report unpaid bills as follows: To the sexton, \$35.00, For lightning rods, 1 Mattock and other items. Resolved to take up a collection for contingent expenses. Joseph Brown, Clerk

Jan. 31st 1859

Joseph Brown resigned as Clerk & Treasurer and John Wallace was elected to fill his place. Trustees elected, Thos. McQuiston, David Ramsey, James Brown, Sr., Jeremiah Rankin and William Wilson.

Hugh Elliott reported on Pastor's Salary. Moved that John McDill, D. Alex. Gray and Thomas Ramsey be appointed singing clerks, and that they make some suitable arrangments to improve the music in the church. Isaac McCracken added to the list of singing Clerks.

Sept. 19th 1859

Committee of three, Hugh Elliott, David McDill & John Simpson, appointed to draft resolutions giving expression to the feelings of the congregation respecting the affliction which has befallen us in the decease of our Pastor.

Resolutions reported and accepted, viz: "Whereas, God in his Providence has been pleased to afflict us by the death of our beloved Pastor, Rev. S. W. McCracken, who has been endeared to us by a pastorate of near twenty years, therefore

Resolved That as a congregation, we would acknowledge the hand of God in this dispensation which has deprived us of a faithful and devoted pastor.

Resolved That we strive to emulate him in his deep toned piety, and earnest devotedness to the cause of Christ and love to the souls of men.

Resolved That we deeply sympathize with the family of the deceased in their bereavement and earnestly commend them to the care and protection of Him, who is the Father of the fatherless and the widows Judge.

Resolved That the secretary of this meeting be instructed to forward the foregoing resolutions to the "Presbyterian Witness", "The United Presbyterian of the West" and the "United Presbyterian of Pittsburg" for publication.

Congregation decided for the trustees to purchase two large stoves, to take the place of the old ones in the Meeting House, also to have the window blinds painted. Decided to pay supplies \$10.00 per day to take up subscriptions for supplies for four months, and to pay for repairs already made on the house.

Hugh Elliott to collect the salary due to Mr. McCracken. Samuel Buck, Chairman John Wallace, Clerk

Jan. 30th 1860

Same trustees, Clerk and Treasurer continued for another year. Subscription to be taken for supplies for one year to be paid quarterly in advance to the Treasurer.

Dr. Brown's expenses to be paid, while on his recent visit & home. Subscription to be taken to defray his expenses. (Re Rev. McCracken?)

Resolved that they pay pulpit supplies \$8.00 per day and their expenses from the supply Fund. Hugh McQuiston, Chairman John Wallace, Clerk

April 19th 1860

Called meeting for the purpose of making out a call for Rev. R. H. Pollock to become Pastor of Hopewell. Rev.

J. Y. Schouller appointed by Presbytery to moderate the call. John Wallace, Clerk

June 30th 1860

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Meeting called for the purpose of rescinding action of former meeting. The Presbytery returned the call for Rev. R. H. Pollock. Reasons: 1st. A majority of the session did not sign. 2nd. A majority of the congregation did not sign. 3rd. The salary offered was inadequate.

July 30th 1860

Meeting called for purpose of making out a call for a pastor. Rev. J. Y. Scouller moderated the call for Mr. Joseph McHatton. Andrew Hamilton was appointed commissioner to carry said call to Presbytery. Call properly signed. John Wallace, Clerk

Jan. 28th 1861

Trustees appointed Thomas Brown, Robert Brown, Robert Buck, James Wright, Andrew McClanahan. Moved that the minister's salary be paid semi-annually. Motion lost.

Decided that the congregation pay for supplies for another quarter. Rev. J. Welsh, present John Wallace, Clerk

Jan. 27th 1862

Meeting organized by prayer by Rev. Jos. McHatton. Constitution read. (A copy of the Constitution of the Church will be found elsewhere in these Hopewell papers.)

Same Trustees for another year. The trustees were authorized to fix the graveyard fence and build two <u>Privies</u>.

Jan. 26th 1863

Opened by prayer by Rev. J. B. Foster. John Simpson appointed to see Mr. Thomas Pinkerton if he has the minutes of Hopewell Congregation from its first organization, to get them if Mr. P. is willing to part with them & if he should not, to secure a copy of them.

James McDill, William Marshall, R. P. Gilmore, John Douglass, J. S. Brown & James Wright were elected trustees.

A subscription to raise money to pay off indebtedness of the congregation, also one to raise money to build a wood house on the church lot. Mr. McHatton was granted leave of absence to visit the 47th & 93rd Ohio, also the 37th Ind. Reg. and such others as he may find practible to visit.

Thomas McQuiston & John McDill appointed a committee to arrange with singing clerks. W. G. Ramsey, Clk.

Jan. 25th 1864

Minutes of early Hopewell congregation not yet found. H. Elliott, John Sloan and Andrew Hamilton were appointed to procure a running history of Hopewell congregation from its commencement to the present time. D. Faris, James Brown, Jr., T. L. Ramsey, Samuel Hamilton & John Sloan elected trustees. W. G. Ramsey, Clk.

Jan. 31st 1865

Rev. Jos. McHatton & Hugh McQuiston were added to the committee on Church History. Decided to take a collection 1st Sabbath of every month for the Contingent Fund.

Congregation in favor of selecting a parsonage committee of five, to raise funds and purchase a lot and erect a parsonage. Committee: John Ramsey, Jr., Wm. Gray, David Ramsey, David Faris & Thomas McQuiston.

Trustees directed to put a gate between the Church and Grave yards. David Ramsey appointed Treasurer of the Pastor's Salary. John Simpson, Clk. Pro Tem

June 10th 1865

F

Col. J. Wallace in the chair. Chairman of building committee reports \$1980.00 suscribed to the parsonage fund.

Aug. 12th 1865

Amount subscribed to Parsonage Fund \$2812.00. Trustees report a site for a parsonage can be procured on John Sloan's land opposite the Township House. Trustees, instructed to procure a site and build a parsonage.

Aug. 21st 1865

Instructions to trustees on last meeting reconsidered and rescinded. Trustees instructed to procure the property of Mrs. McCracken for a parsonage. Trustees to make any necessary repairs. The pastor to pay the taxes annually.

Jan. 29th 1866

Trustees reelected but John Sloan and James Brown resigned. William Gray & James Wright chosen in their place and James McDill in place of David Faris, deceased.

Unity Congregation to be allowed to send an agent into this congregation to solicit aid in erecting a church in or near College Corner.

Trustees instructed to make some new seats in front and at the west side of the pulpit if practicable.

Apr. 23rd 1866

Trustees instructed to close the door in the North end of the church. Trustees also instructed to prosecute any one who disturbs the congregation while worshiping.

The seats in the S. West corner of the church be appropriated for the colored people, if Bower Rock assents. That there be an usher at each door to show strangers to a seat. John McDill & Thomas McQuiston appointed

ushers and authorized to put strangers in the first vacant seat.

Jan. 28th 1867

John McDill resigned as singing clerk. On motion of Robt. Marshall, the prosecution of disturbers in meeting was ordered stricken out of minutes of Apr. 23, 1866.

Committee of five app't'd. to select a site for the session house. Robert Paxton, David Ramsey, Hugh Ramsey, Jr., Wm. Caskey and John C. McDill, trustees. Committee for session house site--R. Paxton, A. Hamilton, J. S. Rankin, R. Marshall & H. Elliott.

Andrew Gray and A. McQuiston appointed to assist in singing. Committee for session house site reported a site on the South hill of the church lot, the east end of the session house to be set to range with the west side of the church. Recommend that the trustees be authorized to erect a building 18 X 30 ft., 8 ft. on the west end of the building to be partioned off for a wood house. Building to be either frame or brick as the trustees think most economical.

Committee to make an estimate of the cost of the building: Wm. Caskey, John Hamilton & Samuel Foster. Trustees to circulate subscription for the house before the work is commenced. Treas. of the Minister's Salary to present subscription to the young men who attend church. Regulations of the pews left to the clerk.

Any person having a pew and wanting to change may do so if there is a vacant pew without an applicant for the same.

The resolution granting three pews in the S.W. corner of the church for colored persons was rescinded, and the pews in front of the pulpit were appropriated for colored persons.

Parsonage Suscriptions to be collected if possible but without litigations. Those who have paid liberally to be released from further payment. Trustees authorized to build chimney at parsonage.

Apr. 27th 1867

Report of committee on cost of Session house report an estimate of \$572.20 for house 18 X 30 ft. Trustees authorized to raise the amount by subscription.

Motion made by Robert Marshall & carried that the trustees be instructed to keep the Meeting House and appurtenances thereto belonging, in a decent and respectable manner. May levy tax on the seats but not to levy tax on those not able to pay. Moved that the seats be painted and walls repapered.

Amended: That all the inside woodwork be painted. Motion to paint the pews cherry color--lost. The color of the pews left to the trustees.

Jan. 27th 1868

Motion of R. Sloan that the trustees keep a book of Dr & Credit. Motion of Samuel Hamilton that they elect their own treasurer.

Trustees reported they did not receive sufficient subscription to build session house. Trustees authorized to use enough of money on hand for repairs and to pay present indebtedness to James Harper, Sexton.

R. P. Gilmore, James I. Gilmore, D. A. Gray, James Marshall, Wm. Wilson elected trustees. W. G. Ramsey resigned as Clerk & Treasurer and S. R. Ramsey elected in his place.

Elders instructed to circulate a new subscription for Minister's Salary. The Treasurer of Minister's Salary to procure a book to take subscriptions in. Trustees authorized to <u>take down</u> and <u>rebuild</u> the session house the same size as now. W. G. Ramsey, Clerk

Jan. 25th 1869

Trustees report that they have done almost nothing. Report of Minister's salary \$998.00 on last year. Trustees elected: David McQuiston, Sr., Samuel McQuiston, John Sloan, Alexander Paxton and Samuel Graham.

Moved by Hugh Elliott that the minister's salary be paid semi-annually in advance. Carried. Moved by Hugh McQuiston that the Trustees be authorized to build a new session house in connection with a wood house without instructions. Carried. S. R. Ramsey, Clerk

Mar. 29th 1869

Called meeting by the Trustees. The vote of a former meeting locating the session House south west of the' church reconsidered. Decided the session house be set 35 ft. west of the church ranging with the south end of the church. The fence on the west side of the church be set in a line with the west side of the session house.

Moved Mr. Gordon be invited to lecture in the church on next Thur. & Friday evenings in reference to the manners & customs of India.

June 26th 1869

Trustees report the cost of Session house \$535.15. They were authorized to circulate a subscription book to raise money to pay for it. Trustees authorized to make a fence on a line with the south end of the Church and Session House. S. R. Ramsey, Clerk

Jan. 31st 1870

Trustees reported indebtedness of \$44.55. Trustees elected: John Buck, Wm. Caskey, James S. Brown, James I. Gilmore, Andrew McQuiston.

Motion of John Sloan that the balance on <u>clock</u> be paid out of contingent fund. Reported \$1170 paid on Minister's Salary last year. Adjourned with prayer by David Mc-Quiston of Kansas.

Jan. 30th 1871

Trustees reelected. Pastor's Salary report--\$1080 pd. \$50 unpaid. Motion by Dr. R. Sloan that the pastor's

salary be fixed at \$1200.00 until otherwise ordered. Carried. Trustees authorized to repair the parsonage and call on the congregation for money to pay for it.

Dr. Sloan moved that Prof. John Marshall take the singing in charge and call to his aid male & female. Carried. The choir requested to sit near the pulpit.

Jan. 29th 1872

Trustees elected: J. A. Elliott, I. McCracken, A. B. Rock, D. A. Gray and J. S. Ramsey. R. J. Brown elected Secretary & Treasurer. A. B. Gray & W. P. McQuiston appointed ushers. A collection for the contingent fund to be taken next Sat. Feb. 3, 1872.

Trustees instructed to put a pump in the well at the parsonage. Robt. J. Brown, Sec.

Jan. 27th 1873

On motion that the new & revised versions of the psalms be used in our church service. Carried. The resignation of John Marshall, choir leader accepted. John A. Elliott was chosen as leader of the choir. Trustees elected: J. A. Elliott, J. A. Brown, A. B. Rock, J. S. Ramsey & David Ramsey.

The stone fence on the east of the grave yard to be built due north and south.

June 13th 1873

Called meeting. Delegates elected to Presbytery, J. A. Elliott to represent the board of Trustees and David Ramsey to represent the congregation.

Jan 26th 1874

Rev. J. McHatton, Moderator. Trustees elected: Wm. Wilson, Dr. R. Sloan, Andrew Brown, S. Paxton & J. S. Brown. Constitution read. The motion to pay the pastor semi-

annually in advance was rescinded and motion carried to pay the salary 1/2 in advance and the rest at the end of the year.

J. A. Elliott and R. J. Miller were appointed leaders of the choir. The seats were declared free, and the location of the choir was left to the leaders.

Feb. 10th 1874

New subscription for the pastor's salary for the year ordered to be taken. Trustees to ascertain what portion of the pastor's salary could not be collected and raise this by subscription.

Sept. 5th 1874

The session requested the congregation to give the pastor, Rev. J. MacHatton a vacation. Congregation granted a vacation of two months or longer.

Jan. 25th 1875

Trustees elected: A. C. McQuiston, John Marshall, Jas. McDill, Wm. Caskey and R. P. Gilmore. Report on Pastor's salary as follows:

The Collector of Pastor's salary, Mr. David Ramsey, was directed to collect the amount due in 30 days or take notes not to run more than 90 days. The motion to fix the pastor's salary at \$1200 was rescinded.

Mr. MacHatton gave notice that he would resign as pastor at the next meeting of Presbytery. R. J. Brown was appointed Treas. for the pastor's salary in Mr. David Ramsey's stead. The trustees to circulate a subscription to meet the delinquencies of salary.

Mar. 29th 1875

Called meeting to take some action in regard to Mr. Mac-Hatton's resignation as pastor.

Mr. Robert Marshall presented the following resolution which after considerable discussion was adopted: "Whereas our pastor at the late annual meeting gave notice to this congregation that he would offer his resignation at the next regular meeting of Presbytery, resolved that we acquiesce in his request." James McDill was appointed commissioner to Presbytery. Rob. J. Brown, Sec.

May 22nd 1875

Called meeting. The trustees were instructed to raise money for supplies for six months.

A resolution was presented from Morning Sun congregation asking Hopewell congregation to unite with them in building a church at Morning Sun.

The following resolution presented by Wm. Caskey was adopted: "Whereas the Morning Sun congregation proposed to Hopewell congregation to unite with them and build a church in Morning Sun

Therefore Resolved that leaving the building site entirely out of the question at present, we cordially invite Morning Sun to come and unite with us."

Mr. Hugh Elliott presented the following resolution: "Resolved that we the members of Hopewell Congregation in meeting assembled take this opportunity to express our sympathy with our late pastor in his affliction, and that we feel we have lost an able expounder of the word, a faithful pastor in visiting and catechising, and a sympathizing friend and adviser at the sick bed."

*NOTE: An ailing Rev. McHatton returned from Paris far short of his expected 6-8 month "vacation" tour of Europe. This may explain the lack of genuine grief by his former congregation. The spelling of his name remains a mystery. In the Session records, he was "McHattan, McHatten, Mc-Hatton"; the Congregational records added "MacHatton". M. P. Palmer

Jan. 31st 1876

Present board of trustees reelected. A proposition and resolution was presented from Morning Sun congregation. On motion this paper was laid on the table for the present. To continue taking collections on Sabbath until the expenses of the congregation were defrayed.

The following resolution was presented by Hugh McQuiston: "Resolved that we build a new church and locate it in Morning Sun and continue the name Hopewell and invite the members of Morning Sun congregation to unite with us and assist in building the church." Motion lost.

Reconsidered, and decided to vote by ballot. Laid on the table until next meeting.

Article 2nd of the Constitution (of Hopewell Church) was so amended to read as follows: "That every member of this congregation being in good standing shall be considered a member in all congregational meetings."

Adjourned to meet at 12 1/2 o clock.

Same day & place at 12 1/2 o clock

Resolution presented by Mr. Hugh McQuiston was presented and voted on by ballot. Result: 32 against, 31 for. Lost.

It was decided to take up a subscription for the purpose of building a new church on the site of the present church. J. A. Brown, R. P. Gilmore and A. C. McQuiston appointed to solicit subscriptions.

4 seats in the back of the church were donated for the use of the choir.

Feb. 22, 1876

The subscription committee for building new church had no report to make and were discharged. And motion for building a church rescinded.

A committee of 3 appointed to make estimates of costs for repairing the church: Wm. Caskey, R.P. Gilmore & James McDill said committee. Trustees to raise money to pay for supplies.

Mar. 20, 1876

Committee on estimates and repairs made a verbal report. Objected. James McDill, A. C. McQuiston and John Marshall resigned as trustees. John Hamilton, Hugh Ramsey and W. P. McQuiston elected in their place.

Decided to pay traveling expenses of delegates to Presbytery and Synod out of contingent fund. W. P. McQuiston elected Treasurer; J. I. Gilmore, Secretary.

Trustees instructed to sell parsonage. It was decided to circulate subscription to raise funds to build a new House of Worship, in 1877, 1/2 subscription to be paid May 1, 1877, one half Jan 1, 1878. Said subscription not to be binding unless the sum of \$5000 be raised. A. P. Paxton, W. P. McQuiston & Hugh Ramsey to raise subscription. R. J. Brown, Sec.

- * NOTE: One hundred members of Hopewell decided to unite with Morning Sun Congregation and help build a new church in the village of Morning Sun. They continued to worship with Hopewell until the New Church was built, uniting with Morning Sun by letter, Jan. 12, 1877. They had however helped in the building of the church in 1876 both by work and money. Their names are not mentioned in any of the transactions of the Hopewell Church from this time. Leila Ramsey Lemon
- **NOTE: On the following page is printed the Session Records of Dec. 28, 1876. It contains the names of the 101 persons granted certificates of dismissal to join Morning Sun congregation.

The Session had been granting certificates for persons wishing to join Morning Sun church for some time prior to this date and more certificates were granted after this date. This is merely the record of the mass exodus.

Hopewell Church never really recovered financially from this great loss of members. Elsewhere in this book are the reported number of Hopewell members: 1874-242 members, 1876-216 members, 1877-96 members, 1878-113 members and 1879-103 members.

Jan. 28, 1878

Trustees report the parsonage sold to David C. Ramsey for \$1500.00. Rec'd. \$500 cash, balance to be paid in two anual payments which are secured by note and mortgage. Received \$700 on Jan. 14th.

Meeting House repaired, reducing the size of the audience room by cutting off a vestibule of about 12 feet in width. Putting on a plain cornice, reroofing, papering and painting it.

Total cost of repairing, \$582.61. Money raised partly by subscription and partly by the envelope system.

"The movement that Hopewell disband was moved and seconded. The question was then open for discussion. By unamimous vote the motion that we disband was carried."

"It was moved and seconded that the present members of session are hereby instructed to present the petition of this congregation to the Commission of the First Presbytery of Ohio, now in charge of the Hopewell Congregation for an order and directions to disorganize the congregation and certify the members, as they desire, to other churches. The motion was unanimously adopted."

"The following resolution was presented and on motion was unanimously adopted: Resolved the trustees of this congregation be and are hereby ordered and directed to deed the church building and land on which it is located and contiguous thereto in trust to the Trustees of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church of North America for the use of the United Presbyterian Church to direct the care of and use of said property for religious and educational uses having the following persons as custodians thereof: John M. Paxton, Samuel G. Tuttley and D. C. Mc-Quiston and on their inability or refusal to act, said Presbytery shall appoint proper persons from the present congregation to act as said members are capable of acting as custodians, and Presbytery shall consider the recommend-

dation of any association that may be formed for preserving the said building in appointing custodians."

The said trustees of the congregation are hereby ordered and directed to sell the parsonage property and to turn the proceeds of said sale into the hands of said custodians for the upkeep and repair of said church building. The elders of the congregation are directed to properly dispose of all personal property of the congregation."

"The meeting to adjourn to meet at the same hour, Oct. 7, 1915 was carried. The closing prayer was offered by Rev. 5. H. McDill." "Samuel G. Tuttley, Chairman Margaret McQuiston, Secretary"

"Hopewell Congregation met as authorized on Nov. 11, 1915. The meeting was opened by singing two verses of No. 199 and prayer by Rev. W. E. Paxton."

"The minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted. By request the minutes of Sept. 9, 1915 were reread. A report from the trustees of the sale of the parsonage property was given and unanimously approved." A motion was unanimously carried that Rev. Paxton visit the absent trustee, A. R. McClanahan, for the purpose of learning his approval of the said sale."

"A resolution that the congregations, taking interconsidered ation that the term of the trustees had expired and that they were acting until their successors were appointed and that now proceed a full board of trustees, which resulted in the following being elected trustees: John M. Paxton, S. G. Tuttley, D. C. McQuiston, L. E. Paxton and W. M. Paxton."

"The motion was carried that two ladied be appointed as additional custodians. Mrs. S. H. Farr and Miss Anna Buck were appointed."

"Rev. Paxton's suggestion that we prepare a resolution for extended preservation of present site was adopted. Adjourned to meet Dec. 2, 1915."

PREFACE

These Session Records of the Hopewell Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, May, 1850-Sept., 1872, have been abridged and, in some cases, annotated for historic and geographic backgrounds and for the understanding of nowobscure words, etc.

Only the final entry, Sept. 2, 1872, pages 26-27, has been copied in its entirety. All other minutes are equally detailed, listing the names of the men giving the opening and closing prayers, the names of all Ruling Elders present, reading and approving of the previous minutes and all the small details of running a large congregation.

It is hoped that all material of historical nature and of human interest has ben retained. It may come as a surprise to some that over 100 years ago, dancing was declared a Sin. Even today, dancing is still a somewhat unresolved problem in some of the more strict churches.

Whenever possible, the original wording has been used; the spelling is also of the original records, if it can be understood. Almost throughout, "ordinances" was spelled "ordainances". "Neglect of ordinances" referred to "church attendance"; "Sealing ordinances" meant "Lord's Supper/Communion".

Hopewell, May 24, A.D. 1850

Session met and was constituted with prayer by the Moderator Mr. McCracken.

Members present: John Ramsey, John Buck, James Brown, Hugh McQuiston, George Ramsey & David M. McDill.

The following persons presented themselves for admission to the priveleges of the church and on examination were received, viz: MARGARET BUCK, RHODA HAYSE, CLARISSA HAMILTON, CAROLINE BROWN, JAMES H. BENNETT & ATALINE, his wife.

MRS. ELIZABETH BROWN was received on certificate from the Reformed Presbyterian Church (probably Beechwoods). Session then adjourned to meet tomorrow at ten oclock.

Hopewell, May 25, A.D. 1850

Session metthere is a difficulty existing between Martha Hayse, a member of this congregation, and Wm. Smith, a member of Unity (College Corner) Congregation, that the said Martha Hayes be advised to abstain from the ordinance of the Lord's Supper on tomorrow. D. M. McDill, Clerk

Hopewell, June 9, 1850

Dr. R. (Richard) Sloan, member of session, was appointed to attend Presbytery at its next meeting at Oxford on 18th Inst.

Hopewell, Aug. 2, A.D. 1850

Session met...MARY A. HART and JONATHAN C. PAXTON on personal examination were received to the fellowship of the church.

It having been understood by session that John Hayse was not admitted as a witness in the case of Wm. Smith before Presbytery on account of having spoken improperly with regard to the said Wm. Smith and having been requested to attend the present meeting of Session did so and stated that he believed he never used the expression attributed to him by And(rew) & Samuel Brown concerning Wm. Smith, in their deposition before Presbytery.

(Re the above matter, and "Samuel Brown made conflicting statements respecting a certain piece of writing said to have been written by Wm. Smith in which his name was used", the following men were requested to appear on the 9th at <u>9 PM</u>: Samuel & Andrew Brown, John Hayse, James Bell, David & Israel & Alexander Gray.)

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Hopewell, Aug. 9th 1850

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Session met...Martha Hayse no longer had to abstain from the Lord's SupperAndrew & Samuel Brown "stated that John Hayse did say in their hearing that the way Wm. Smith had acted was worse than a horse thief". "John Hayse stated that he had no recollection of having uttered such words and whilst he did not allow himself to speak in such a manner in relation to any member of the church yet he did not wish to be understood as charging the witnesses with stating anything but what they felt to be their convictions and admitted he might have said what made the impression on their minds which they testified."

John Hayse was therefore admonished to be more careful in future and the matter was dismissed.

The case against Samuel Brown was dismissed.

MARY McDILL was received on certificate from the A.R. Church at Oxford and HERVEY RAMSEY from the A.R. Church at Newbury, New York.

Certificates (of dismissal) were granted to MRS. RACHEL BOYCE and her daughters, ANNA & MARY JANE and her sons, DAVID & ANDREW F. BOYCE. David M. McDill, Clerk

October 20th A.D. 1850--George Ramsey to attend Synod

Hopewell, Oct. 25, A.D. 1850

"Mr. Robert Patterson having previously sent word to session that he had had a difficulty with a certain person near Camden which resulted in a personal rencounter, and that he was willing to meet with Session and make such acknowledgments as might be proper in the case, came forward at this time and made such acknowledgments as were satisfactory to session."

MR. JAMES McCRACKEN & wife were received on certificate as members of this congregation.

March 16, 1851 A certificate was granted to MRS. NANCY BELL to join Fairhaven Church.

<u>March 30th 1851</u> Certificates were granted to JAMES BROWN, Ruling Elder, his wife MARGARET, & their daughters MISS MARY BUCK & CAROLINE BROWN.

Hopewell, April 3rd 1851

The following persons were received upon personal examination, viz: J. SCOTT BROWN, MARGARET A. McQUISTON & JANE PAXTON. Certificates granted to JOHN GRAHAM & wife.

Hopewell, April 4th A.D. 1851

MARGARET STEWART was received on personal examination & a certificate granted to MRS. ELIZABETH MORRISON. On April 5th, MRS. NANCY MCQUISTON & MRS. ELIZA ANN DOUGLASS were received on certificate from Fairhaven Session. On the same evening MR. JAMES McCRACKEN was unanimously elected Ruling Elder.

April 3rd and onward

The Church had its own full-scale Judiciary Investigations, actually Courts, complete with sworn witnesses, signed testimony, Citations to appear, questioning by the Court, and "libels", formal written charges delivered to the accused.

In 1847, George Simpson and his wife, Nancy, had separated, and Mr. Simpson was under suspension by the church. In 1851 there was a divorce granted by the State and Mr. Simpson wanted his suspension lifted. Instead he got a Judiciary Hearing.

Witnesses included Samuel Smith, James O. Smith, Dr. A. W. Pinkerton, Dr. Richard Sloan (who never testified), Robert Paxton, Dr. Eli Gilmore and John Graham who had moved to Illinois or Iowa and never appeared. Robert Paxton and Samuel Smith seem to have been witnesses for Mr. Simpson. Mrs. Simpson had no witnesses nor was she present nor was she represented in any manner.

The only eye-witness complaint about Mrs. Simpson was "in Harvest at Mr. Simpson's, it appeared that a different table was set for the accused and the work hands from the rest of the family". Question by Court: "Did you see anything in Mrs. Simpson's conduct which led you to suppose that she was an imprudent woman?" Ans.: "Nothing more than stated."

Mrs. Simpson told Robert Paxton that she would not return unless Mr. Simpson gave assurance that he would treat her well. He refused, giving various reasons about faithfulness, squandering his property, neglect of domestic duties and "bruising him in the night when asleep".

Dr. Eli Gilmore had treated her twice, after separation, for intermittant fever. Mr. Simpson had no statement in his own defence.

"....unanimous Judgment of Session that the accused had entirely failed to Justify his conduct in living separate and apart from his wife. Suspension continued." The Simpsons legal divorce was of no importance to the case.

The official ruling is as follows: "Whereas the business of teaching a dancing school is inconsistent with the word of God and the rules and practice of the A. R. Church founded thereon and hurtful in its tendency to Christian character and the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ." Suspension continued.

Sept. 19, 1852 John Buck to attend Presbytery and James McCracken to attend Synod at Xenia.

Nov. 12, 1852 ISAAC McCRACKEN & FRANCES A. RAMSEY were received on personal examination.

Reports circulating against Hervey Graham for misrepresentation and unfair dealing with Mrs. Polly G. Smith in a certain horse trade. The case was dismissed later.

Hopewell, Nov. 13, 1852 MRS. ELLEN PATTERSON was received on Certificate from the General Assembly P. Church. Also SAMUEL MCHAFFEY & JANE his wife, from the Fairhaven Congregation.

April, 1853 Certificates were given to MATILDA SMITH, ELIZABETH BROWN, WILLIAM MCBRIDE AND ELIZA ANN, his wife.

<u>May 13, 1853</u> The following persons were received on personal examination, viz: JAMES MARSHALL, LUCY RAMSEY, ELLEN STEWART, ELIZABETH JANE WILSON, SARAH BELL. On certificate GEORGE SIMPSON.

It was reported that James M. Ramsey had been at different times intoxicated since last communion. He was requested to abstain next Sabbath.

"It being known to some of the Session that Samuel McHaffey and his wife had engaged in keeping a toll gate on the public turnpike road on Sabbath as well as week days, it was also Resolved that they be kept back from sealing ordinances for the present."

Saturday, May 14, 1853 ROBERT HAYS & WIFE were received on certificate from Unity Church (College Corner).

<u>Aug. 15th 1854</u> The following persons were received, to wit: FRANCIS WILEY, NATHAN R. BROWN, ROBERT GILMORE, WM. S. SLOAN, CATHERINE DOUGLASS, NANCY M. BROWN and on certificate JOHN C. BROWN. Hopewell, Oct. 3, 1954 JOHN BROWN & WIFE were received on certificate from Fairhaven Church.

NOV., 1954 NANCY MARIA HERRON dismissed on certificate. WM. MCBRIDE & WIFE & JAMES HAYS received certificates to connect with Fairhaven Church.

Hopewell, May 11, 1855 JAMES FULTON was received on personal examination and ELIZA BROWN, wife of JOSEPH BROWN, on certificate.

Aug. 10th 1855 JOHN HAMILTON & THOMAS B. GRAHAM & SARAH WILSON, JOHN WALLACE AND MARY, his wife, on certificate.

<u>April 11th 1856</u> The following persons were received to wit, on certificate from Fairhaven, MARY HAMILTON, on personal examination GEORGE W. SIMPSON, JOHN P. MARSHALL & SAMUEL J. WILEY.

Certificates were ordered to ANDREW BELL & WIFE to connect with Fairhaven. George Ramsey to attend Presbytery.

<u>Dec. 18th 1856</u> MRS. HANNAH McCLANAHAN was received on certificate from the Free Presbyterian Church and certificates ordered for DAVID A. McQUISTON & WIFE to connect with Unity Church.

<u>April 17th 1856</u> The following were received on examination: WM. McQUISTON, JOHN P. MARSHALL, MARGARET BROWN, JAMES BROWN and on certificate J. WM. CASKEY, DAVID P. GREY & WIFE.

<u>Sept. 4th 1857</u> MARY McQUISTON was admitted on examination; MARTHA A. McDILL, JAMES DAVIDSON & MARY his wife, were received on certificate.

Nov. 26th 1857 ELEANOR RAMSEY & RUFUS JOHNSTON were received on personal examination to full membership. Hopewell, Apr. 13th 1858 The following persons were admitted to full communion for the first time: MARY A. BROWN, CAROLINE BROWN, REBECKAH GRAHAM & SARAH MARSHALL.

<u>April 17th, 1858</u> The following persons were received on certificate: WILLIAM MCBRIDE & wife, ELIZA ANN, JOHN BROWN & his wife, RACHEL, SAMUEL PAXTON and his wife, MARY JANE.

Resolved: to expand the number of Ruling Elders. The names of Hugh Elliott, David Ramsey, Thos. M. Buck and Samuel McQuiston will be proposed to the Congregation.

<u>Aug. 3rd 1858</u> David Ramsey sent in a paper declining ordination as Ruling Elder. The remaining 3 men were ordained.

<u>Aug. 12th 1858</u> The following were on examination received into the church, to wit: ISRAEL F. BROWN, NANCY E. HAMILTON, REBECCA A. HAMILTON, CAROLINE E. McCLANAHAN, MARTHA A. GILMORE, EMMA DENNY, SAMUEL C. FOSTER & his wife, HANNAH A. FOSTER, & NANCY MARSHALL.

<u>Aug. 14th 1858</u> ELIZABETH BONNER & CHARLOTTE McCRACKEN were received on personal examination.

Oct. 31st 1858 Certificates of dismission were on application ordered for DAVID P. GRAY & HIS WIFE to connect with Shilow (Shiloh?) Congregation, Indiana.

Nov. 5th 1858 The following persons were received to the communion of the church on personal examination, to wit: ROBERT MILLER, THOMAS H. FOSTER, SAMUEL M. McCRACK-EN, WILLIAM RAMSEY, WILLIAM MARSHALL, WILLIAM GRAHAM, MARY JANE McCREARY, MARY BONNER, CATHERINE WALLACE & SARAH RACHEL McQUISTON.

Nov. 6th 1858 The following persons were received on examination: JOHN J. WATT & his wife MATILDA; on certificate JOHN MAGEE & his wife REBECKAH from Ebenezer Cong. & J. MILLIGAN GRAHAM from Oxford Cong. A certificate of dismission was ordered for MRS. REBEKAH SMITH to connect with Unity Cong.

<u>April, 1859</u> The following persons were admitted to full communion for the first time, to wit: SAMUEL RAMSEY, ROBERT J. BROWN, SAMUEL M. MCDILL. On certificate SAMUEL BROWN & his wife and ELLEN GILMORE. Hopewell, May 1859 William Graham had been temporarily suspended due to certain scandlous and dishonest reports in rumor against him.

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"After considerable consultation and diliberation it was unanamously agreed that inasmuch as Wm. Graham had been frequently dealt with by this Session for unchristian conduct by advice and admonition without apparently producing any salutory effect and as the cause of religion was being injured by his frequent impropiety of conduct.

Therefore, resolved that his suspension be continued and public intimation of this action of Session given."

The case of Hervey Graham was a violation of the eighth commandment and it appeared probable that a civil prosecution would be instituted, so he was suspended and given public intimation.

July 29th 1859 The following were received on personal examination: NATHAN L. RAMSEY, WILLIAM S. RAMSEY, AN-DREW B. GRAY, JOSEPH H. RAMSEY, ANN MARSHALL, MARY MAR-SHALL, MARGARET A. THOMPSON, MARTHA A. GILMORE, NANCY G. GRAY. On certificate: ROBERT ROCK & RUTH, his wife, and AGNESS WALLACE.

<u>Aug. 11th 1859</u> "Session met....to consider the case of Wm. Ramsey of whom unfavorable reports have been in circulation for some time past.....unananimously agreed to prefer the following libel against said Wm, Ramsey.

Charge 1st: Using profane language in saying when speaking of reports in circulation about him last spring "they are all a pack of damned lies" or words to that effect. Also cursing and using profane language to Wm. Marshall at Nathan Sloan's at a certain time last spring or the present summer.

Charge 2nd: Using profane and obscene language at different times, particularly in a letter or communication to James Kennedy.

Charge 3rd: Slandering himself and other." The self-slander consists of bragging about his sex life during the Spring to Fall of 1858.

<u>Aug. 29th 1859</u> (This case seems to have all the validity of "high school locker room bragging". Who would mention his sex life, real or fancied, at a Spelling Match? Many witnesses appear to have been fellow classmates at Morning Sun Academy. The stories were circulated and a lot of teenagers found themselves involved in a Church Court case usually reserved for adults.) Almost all boys in the Nov. 5, 1858 "Communicants Class" were witnesses. They were about 18 years old at the time of the trial; or about 17 years old in 1858 when all of this was started into the rumor-mill.

It is unknown which Wm. Ramsey was the accused. TWO Wm. Ramsey's were baptized in 1841; there were perhaps 5 or 6 Wm. Ramsey's living in the township. The patriarch of the many, many Ramsey families was William and each family usually had a son named William.

The full Court included Rev. S. W. McCracken, Andrew Hamilton, Hugh McQuiston, Robert Marshall, John Ramsey, John Simpson, Hugh Elliott, Samuel McQuiston, Dr. Richard Sloan and David M. McDill. Hugh McQuiston and Andrew Hamilton were appointed to conduct the examination on the part of the Court.

Amos Reese testified that the accused had called the charges "damned lies".

John Wilson said that Wm. Ramsey bragged of his conquests at a Spelling Match. James W. Johnson had heard the accused using profane language within the last 6 to 12 months. Wm. Wright swore he knew nothing about the case.

Samuel M. McCracken, son of Rev. McCracken, swore that Wm. Ramsey bragged of one occurrence at the beginning of the fall term of Morning Sun Academy and another at the close of school a year ago last June. Wm. Marshall told him "what I already knew". He had never heard accused use profane language.

Joseph G. Sloan supposed he had heard him (accused) use profane language but didn't remember any particular expression. Said Wm. Ramsey made no self-incriminating statement. Andrew McQuiston swore he knew nothing about the charges.

Thomas H. Foster swore that accused told him he sent James Kennedy a letter about valentine time in answer to one he supposed was from Kennedy. Accused told him about a year ago last spring about a sexual encounter.

James Kennedy stated he received an anonymous letter dated Feb. 14th of an obscene character. Kennedy, when asked, could not produce the original letter but had what he called a copy.

Melancthon McMillan testified that Wm. Ramsey said the letter was a valentine. Also observed that it was common to send valentines anonymously. Also was told about a girl.

The letter-valentine was never read in Court because it was a copy, the handwriting could not be identified and the matter was dropped. William C. Bernard heard Wm. Ramsey brag about some girls and had heard him swear by the Almighty and damn in conversation.

Wm. Ramsey told Israel Brown about the valentine and about a girl "when we were planting corn last spring a year ago". Israel Brown also testified that Wm. Marshall cursed Wm. Ramsey at Morning Sun Academy. The language was about as bad on one side as the other.

William Marshall was called as a witness but the accused objected "on the ground that he has been for some time and now is at enmity with said accused". It was then decided to hear the evidence of alleged enmity.

James F. Johnson swore he heard Wm. Marshall say he would use his revolver on the family if they did not look out, meaning the Ramsey family.

Wm. Marshall is reported to have said, before Johnson and James & Israel Brown, that if he passed Ramseys house, "death would be his portion". "But he said he would never commence first." "Did you ever hear accused say he would have revenge on Marshall if it should cost him his life?" "I did." At this point session was adjourned to meet the next day at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer by the Moderator.

Rev. McCracken, the Moderator, was ill the next morning. On Sept. 10th he died.

Hopewell, Oct. 27th 1859 The case was resumed with Rev. J. Y. Schouler, Fairhaven minister, as Moderator; same Ruling Elders present.

After more testimony, Session concluded not to examine Wm. Marshall. It was resolved that evidence on the part of the Court be considered now closed.

"All Witnesses on behalf of the Session before being sworn were solemnly purged of malice against accused as the book of discipline directs."

Samuel Hamilton was recalled for the defence and quoted Israel Brown about the truthfulness of the reports "and he told me there was not a word of them true. They were all a pack of lies".

Hugh McQuiston and John Ramsey, Jr. were also witnesses for the defence and they relied on individual conversations with Israel Brown to refute previous testimony.

In time, William Ramsey was found guilty "of using & uttering profane language, of the sin of using and uttering obscene language and the sin and scandal of slandering himself and others....suspended indefinitely from the privileges of the church".

The following persons were received to full communion of the church on examination, to wit: J. H. WILLIAMSON, NANCY E. BROWN & RACHEL HAWTHORN.

"By appointment of Presbytery, <u>REV. JOSEPH MCHATTAN moder-ated in Session on the 13th April 1860</u> for the first time and administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the following Sabbath." (Written around the margin)

Hopewell, Apr. 13th 1860 The following persons were received on examination: JOHN P. BUCK, ROBERT PAXTON, MARTHA HERRON.

July 26th 1860 WILLIAM McBRIDE & WIFE were at their own request dismissed to connect with the U.P. Church at Vienna, Ind. The following persons were received on personal examination: ALEXANDER BAILEY & MARY JANE, his wife, MARGARET ANN DOUGLASS, ELIZABETH JANE GRAHAM & ELMIRA BELL. On certificate: JOHN A. ELLIOTT.

J. CALVIN McCRACKEN was received on cert. Sept. 5, 1860.

WM. GRAHAM was dismissed by certificate Oct. 27, 1860.

NANCY M. FOSTER was dismissed by certificate Nov. 7, 1860.

MRS. RHODA HAYSE was dismissed by certificate Nov. 23, 1860.

THOMAS H. FOSTER was dismissed by certificate Nov. 26, 1860.

<u>Nov. 16, 1860</u> The following persons were received by examination: JAMES D. HERRON, MARY M. HERRON, RACHEL M. GILMORE. On certificate: I. H. HUNT. J. H. WILLIAMSON was dismissed by certificate Nov. 29, 1860

<u>April 12th 1861</u> The following persons were received on examination: BENJAMIN F. GRAHAM, MARY JANE MARSHALL, SINA LOUISA PAXTON, ELIZA JANE McQUISTON. On certificate: MRS. JANY/JENY McCRACKEN & MARY A. GRAY.

WILLIAM GILMORE RAMSEY was received on certificate from Fair Haven Congregation, April 13th 1861. Also MALCOM McCOCHRAN/ M. COCHRAN from General Assemby Pres. Church.

David M. McDill, Clerk of Session, resigned said office and John Simpson was elected in his room.

Certificates were ordered for DAVID M. McDILL & MARTHA A., his wife, and SAMUEL M. McDILL to connect with Oxford congregation. Hopewell, May 27th 1861 Certificates were granted to DAVID M. MCDILL, MARTHA A., his wife, and SAMUEL M. MCDILL to connect with Oxford Congregation.

<u>July 21st 1861</u> Certificates were granted to JAMES DAVID-SON (a ruling Elder) and MARY, his wife, to connect with a Sister Congregation.

June 2nd & July 28th John Buck was appointed to attend the meetings in Richmond and Hamilton of Presbytery.

<u>Auq. 23rd, 1861</u> The following persons were received on examination: GEORGE S. HAMILTON & MARGARET R. MARSHALL. Certificates were granted to ALEXANDER BAILEY & MARY, his wife.

<u>Sept. 26th 1861</u> Robert Marshall was appointed to attend Presbytery at Monroe. Hugh Elliott, his alternate. <u>Oct. 6th 1861</u> Robert Marshall to attend Synod at Xenia.

Hopewell, Nov. 19th 1861 Held a conference in reference to the conduct of certain individuals implicated with dancing. Committee appointed to ascertain the facts. Mr. John Buck to confer with William Gilmore to ascertain his reasons for neglecting to attend the public ordinances. Rev. McHattan to interview James M. Ramsey to affect his restoration.

<u>Nov. 22nd 1861</u> The committee (on dancing) confered with Lucy Ramsey, Margaret Brown, Emma Denna and Mary Jane Mc-Creary who had engaged in dancing. They acknowledged their error and promised to guard against it in the future.

Alexander Bailey, Nathan Bell and Elmira Bell admitted they had engaged in dancing but refused to give Satisfaction for so doing and were notified to refrain from Sealing ordinances until they confessed their error.

The same committee were reappointed to confer with Mr. Bailey, Nathan and Elmira Bell and effect their restoration to privileges. The time to do so left descretionary,

The following persons were received on examination: MARY GRIZZELLA RAMSEY & MARGARET A. SIMPSON.

<u>Nov. 24th</u> ELIZA DOUGLASS received on Certificate from the U.P. Church at Oxford. <u>Dec. 29th</u> John Ramsey to attend Presbytery at Fairhaven.

<u>Feb. 23rd 1862</u> Certificates of dismission granted to JOHN GRAHAM & GRIZZELLA, his wife.

Hopewell, March 3rd 1862 John Buck reported he can conferred with William Gilmore in reference to neglecting the ordainances (ordinances--church attendance, in this case), could not get any reason for such neglect nor any promise from him to do his duty. Andrew Hamilton to confer with Wm. Gilmore.

John Simpson added to the Committee (on dancing). Hugh McQuiston to confer with James L. Brown for various offences and John Ramsey to confer with Samuel Ramsey for violating the rules of this Church by dancing.

Hopewell, March 17th 1862 John Ramsey reported that Samuel Ramsey was not willing to refrain from the practice of dancing. Alex. Bailey, Nathan & Elmira Bell had been equally stubborn. After appointing John Simpson to attend Presbytery at Cincinnati, the following preamble and resolution was unamimously adopted:

"Whereas it is understood by Session that Some of the Members of this Congregation have engaged in promiscuous dancing and whereas Such Conduct is a Violation of the Standards of the U. P. Church (see Larger Cat. [Catechism] Question 139)."

"Session have Resolved that those who have So Violated the Standards of the Church Should not enjoy the Sealing Ordainances (Communion) untill they promise to refrain from Such Conduct in the future."

ISRAEL H. HUNT was dismissed by certificate Mar. 26, 1862.

April 18th 1862 Joseph Ramsey promised to refrain from dancing in the future. JAMES I. FARIS was received on personal examination. April 19th 1862 VIOLET JANE BROWN was received on personal examination. June 1st 1862 Samuel B. McQuiston to attend Presbytery at the first U.P. Church of Cincinnati. Aug. 3rd Voted to invite Unity (College Corner) to unite with us in celebrating the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Notice Aug. 14th Fairhaven Church to to be given Rev. Welsh. be invited to unite for celebrating the Lord's Supper.

Aug. 18th 1862ANDREW C. McQUISTON & DAVID M. BONNERwere received on examination.Aug. 22ndJANE E. SLOAN & MARTHA F. WORDEN were received on exam.Aug. 24thDR. WM. H. GILMORE & MARY A., his wife, re-ceived from U.P. Church of Pope? Run, Illinois.

Hopewell, Sept. 30th 1862 Held a conference in reference to the time and manner of conducting district catechetical examinations. Thomas Buck to attend Presbytery at Oxford. Oct. 19th John Buck to attend Synod at Hopewell. Hopewell, Nov. 5th 1862 The following persons were received on personal examination: THOMAS BROWN, JAMES S. BROWN, DAVID S. MARSHALL, MARY E. BROWN, RACHEL C. BONNER, HARRIET E. BONNER, MARY E. RAMSEY, SARAH S. FOSTER & CAROLINE S. WILSON. <u>Nov. 12th 1862</u> ELENOR McDILL was grantëd a certificate of dismission to connect with the U.P. Church of Unity. (College Corner)

Hopewell, March 24th 1863 "....Proceeded to consider the Book of Government and Discipline overtured to Presbyteries and Sessions with direction to vote Ay or Nay and report to the next General Assembly. Whereupon Session Resolved that the Appellate power of Assemby be limited to matters of Doctrine. Also the amendment submitted as a separate overture in Book 2nd, Chapter 12 and Section 2nd be rejected. Also that Ministers and Licentiates from other churches be received only as Probationers for one year."

The Book of Government and Discipline in its present form was rejected by a vote of Session. Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery in the Mission Church in Cincinnati.

Hopewell, April 17th 1863 A conference with Nathan & Elmira Bell who wish to be restored to the privileges of the Church, promising in the future to conform to the rules of the Church. (re dancing). Request granted.

The following persons were received on personal examination: MARY MARGARET BROWN, GRIZZELLA CATHERINE BROWN, ANNA FOSTER, ANNA ELIZA MANN, MARY CATHERINE MANN, MRS. CAROLINE BROWN, TAMISON DUVALL, FANNY MARSHAL, JOHN C. HAMILTON & JAMES JOHNSON. <u>April 18th 1863</u> Received on certificate: JOHN H. WATT & MATILDA, his wife, & MARTHA ANN KILLOUGH.

Hopewell, Aug. 6th 1863 Rev. McHattan & Hugh Elliott to confer with James M. Ramsey who has been suspended for several years.

"The case of Wm. Graham who was suspended several years ago was taken up and as said Wm. Graham has removed from our bounds and as Session has credible information that said Wm. Graham has connected with a Sect called Campbellites, therefore Resolved that the name of Wm. Graham be erased from our records. John Simpson was appointed to talk with Samuel Ramsey who has been deprived of Sealing ordinances for dancing.

Hopewell, Aug. 13th 1863 John Simpson to confer with Wm. Gilmore about neglect of public ordinances. Paragraph erased. Andrew Hamilton appointed a delegate to Synod at Bloomington, Ia. (the then-abbreviation for "Indiana")

Hopewell, Aug. 21st 1863 James M. Ramsey acknowledged that he had been intoxicated at different times and also that he had used improper language and professed his Sorrow for the same and promised in the future to guard against these Sins. Restored to full privileges.

John Simpson reported a conference with Wm. Gilmore who stated that he had done wrong in neglecting the ordinances and still had difficulties in his mind so that he could see his way clear to join in Sealing ordinances.

The following persons were received on examination: MRS. MARY ANN MCNEALY & JOHN MONTEITH. On certificate from Old School Presbyterian Church (Covenanters): MRS. MATILDA BERNARD & MRS. ANNIE DOUGLASS. <u>Sept. 27th 1863</u> Hugh McQuiston to attend Presbytery at Ebenezer.

Hopewell, Nov. 3rd 1863 to confer with Nathan Ramsey about participating at the late election of Civil rulers.

Hopewell, Nov. 16th 1863 The following persons were received: On certificate from the Methodist Episcopal Church ESTHER BARTHELOW. On examination: JOSEPHINE MUR-RAY & JOHN H. MARSHAL. "The said John H. Marshall being in a delicate state of health and not expected to be able to unite with the Congregation in the celebration of the Lord's Supper on next Sabbath yet desiring publickly to confess Christ was received on private examination by the Moderator at his own home."

"The Committee appointed to confer with Nathan Ramsey failing to obtain a Satisfactory explanation for his voting for C. L. Valandingham, Session resolved to appoint Hugh McQuiston to propose the following questions to Nathan Ramsey which if answered Satisfactoraly would stay further proceedings. If not Satisfactory, the said Nathan Ramsey be requested to refrain from Sealing ordinances till Session obtain furtherlight on this matter."

"Question: Had you believed that in voting for C. L. Valandingham you were voting for the perpetuation and extension of Slavery would you have voted for him."

"Question: Had you believed that in voting for the said Valandingham you were voting for the right of Seccession would you have voted for him."

"Question: Do you feel that it was impropper to vote for

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a man who had been arraigned and condemned as a violator of an order from the Military authorities known as Order No. 38."

Hopewell, Nov. 20th 1863 Nathan Ramsey gave satisfactory answers to questions above proposed to him so far as to stay further process in this case.

The following applicants were received into membership: JOSEPH G. SLOAN, DAVID H. HAMILTON & SARAH RHINEHART. <u>Nov. 27th 1863 & March 27th 1864</u> John Buck to attend Prebytery at Unity & Thomas Buck to attend Presbytery at Dayton.

Hopewell, April 15th 1864 Received on examination: ELIHU C. SIMPSON. On certificate: SABINA GRAHAM. Hugh Elliott to confer with James L. Brown who had been suspended for intoxication. April 16th 1864 James L. Brown confesses his fault (and) professes his Sorrow and is resolved by God's help to live the life of the Christian. Restored to privileges. June 12th 1864 Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Concord Church.

Hopewell, Aug. 15th 1864. John Simpson reported that he had failed to accomplish any thing further than formerly reported with Wm. Gilmore. "Session held a conference in refference to monthly prayer meetings in the different districts of the Congregation, and the interests of the Congregation generally falling off in attendance...but was party attributed to the fact of so many men being called into the Millitary Service of our Country." Hugh McQuiston to attend Synod.

Hopewell, Sept. 2nd 1864 "...to confer with Samuel J. Wylie for neglecting the Ordainances and other unchristian Conduct." The following persons were received on exam: ADAM RANKIN, SAMUEL HERVEY MARSHALL, MRS. FRANCIS PATTER-SON, MARY JANE BROWN, CLARA BROWN, WILLIAM MELANCTHON MC-CREARY. On certificate: MINERVA LANE. Samuel J. Wylie was invited before Session and confessed to the Sin of Intoxication and neglect of the ordainances and was restored. <u>Sept. 25th 1864</u> Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery.

Hopewell, Oct. 7th 1864 "Session held a conference in refference to the Spiritual interests of the Youth under our care, the result of which shewed that in some districts all of a proper age had connected with the Church by a publick profession while in other districts there was a number who have not confessed Christ publickly and require prayerful effort to encourage them to discharge this duty."

Hopewell, Dec. 26th 1864 The following persons were received on personal examination: MRS. KETURAH RAMSEY, MARY MARSHAL, MARY ANN HAMILTON, MARY ELIZABETH SPROUL, WILLIAM H. SPROUL & JAMES MARSHAL. On certificate: MRS. ELIZA SIMPSON and her daughter, HATTIE, & MRS. KILLOUGH.

Hopewell, Dec. 30th 1864 James M. Ramsey came voluntarily before Session and acknowledged to the Sin of intoxication and professed his Sorrow and was restored to privileges.

Hopewell, March 28th 1865 A libel was preferred against Wm. Gilmore for neglect of the ordinances. March 10th 1865 (recorded after Mar. 28th). The libel reads thus: "Whereas it is a duty clearly revealed in the Bible that the members of the Church of Christ Should attend on the publick administrations of the word 'not forsaking the assembling of themselves together'. Nevertheless it is true that you Mr. Wm. Gilmore have for a number of years absented yourself from the house of God , you ought to be proceeded against acording to the nature of your offence. By order of Session." Wm. Gilmore did not appear. John Buck to attend Presbytery at Hopewell.

<u>April 4th and 11th, 1865</u> Hugh Elliott, Dr. Sloan and Hugh McQuiston be a committee to distribute the funds raised by this congregation for the poor. <u>April 14th 1865</u> Hugh Elliott to see Israel Brown and Samuel McQuiston to see Nathan & Elmira Bell in reference to violating our rules on dancing.....

Hopewell, April 15th 1865 Nathan Bell refused to give satisfaction for violating the rules of this Church on dancing and also for breaking his promise made at a former time. Notified to refrain from Sealing ordinance. Elmira Bell made the required acknowledgments and promised to refrain from this practice in the future. <u>April 16th 1865</u> Israel Brown promised to refrain from the practice of dancing in the future. <u>June 4th 1865</u> Robert Marshal to attend Presbytery at Ebenezer.

Hopewell, July 31st 1865 Andrew Hamilton to attend Presbytery at Hamilton. Mr. Hamilton to confer with John Brown about rumors of unjust transactions with different people. Session thereafter to spend half an hour in devotional exercises. Hopewell, August 12th 1865 Received on certificate: DAVID ROBERTSON (a ruling Elder) & MARY, his wife, from Brighton Congregation, Iowa. Mr. Robertson elected a rul-Sept. 17th 1865 David Robertson to ing Elder. attend both Synod and Presbytery. Oct. 30th 1865to confer with Nathan Bell for violation of the Church rule against dancing. Some time given in devotional ex-Dec. 12th 1865 Nathan Bell refuses and ercises. wished to be relieved from further action. Dr. Sloan to confer with Mary Ann and Caroline Brown re violation of the rules about dancing.

Hopewell, Dec. 18th 1865 Received on personal exam: WILLIAM HAMILTON & WIFE, CALVIN HAMILTON, JAMES McCLAN-NAHAN & NARCISSA PAXTON. Dr. Sloan reported that Mary Ann & Caroline Brown admitted that they had violated the rules of this Church by dancing and promised to refrain from this practice. Samuel McQuiston to confer with David M. Bonner re reports injurious to his standing as a member of this Church.

Hopewell, Dec. 22nd 1865 S. McQuiston reported that David M. Bonner sent word that he considered himself out of the church and did not desire any conference. Mr. Mc-Quiston directed to try and get an interview with Mr. Bonner and press on him the duty of submitting to the Church. Samuel McQuiston to attend Presbytery at Oxford.

March 20th 1866 Rev. McHattan reported a Hopewell, conference with Nathan Bell which was Satisfactory to Session and the case was dismissed. At the last meeting a conference was held in reference to scandalous reports on the character of William Douglass, Sr. and Mr. Elliot & McQuiston were appointed to meet with him to ascertain the truth of the rumors. Mr. Douglass was present and gave a statement of his conduct that was not satisfactory with Session, then he left the room. While Rev. McHattan was writing the libel, some members had an interview with Mr. Douglass (who had remained out side of the house) and reported that Mr. Douglass was willing to admit that he might have been guilty of unchasten or improper actions and would submit to whatever Censure the Session thought proper to inflict. Mr. Douglass was admonished before the Court by the Moderator and the action of Session would be made publically to the Congregation on next Sabbath. Mr. Douglass promised to be doubly guarded in the future.

It was reported that David M. Bonner refused to talk or make any concession whatever. Hugh McQuiston to attend Presbytery at 2nd U.P. Church in Cincinnati. Hopewell, April 23rd 1866 David M. Bonner finally acknowledged that he had "frequently drank too much and was Sorry for it and that he had resolved to abstain intirely from intoxicating drinks in the future. Session satisfied. Case dismissed."

"Reports being in circulation that Hugh B. Ramsey, John Ramsey, Jr. & James Ramsey were in the habit of frequenting drinking Saloons and also drinking too freely."

Robert Marshall investigated and ascertained James Ramsey to be entirely clear of the charge. In reference to John Ramsey, "he denies drinking any. Says he has seen its bad effects and will discourage it in others. In reference to Hugh B. Ramsey, he denies taking too much but admits that he has taken it till he could feel it sometimes and claimed that there was nothing in the Constitution or rules of the Church prohibiting him from taking a dram when he was cold or wet."

"On motion of Mr. Marshal it was Resolved that the case of Hugh B. Ramsey be passed over for the present. Carried. The vote being so small Mr. Marshal moved a reconsideration of the resolution which was agreed to and Mr. Marshal was continued a committee to confer with Mr. Ramsey before our next communion."

Hopewell, May 4th 1866 The following persons were received on personal examination: ANDREW BOWER ROCK, MAGGIE McCREARY, ANNETTA MURRY, LIZZIE FOSTER, NANNIE BERNARD. Mr. Marshall had not seen Hugh B. Ramsey and was relieved from further action. <u>May 5th 1866</u> MARY ANN WILSON was received on personal examination. <u>July 1st, 1866</u> Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Monroe.

<u>Hopewell, July 17th 1866</u> "..... Held a conference in refference to reports on members of this congregation who are supposed to have taken part in breaking open the door that had been closed (bricked-up) in the north end of the Church. After a free exchange of views Session resolved to appoint a committee of three to ascertain if these reports were likely to be true & also to confer with the individuals charged and endeavor to make them Sensible of their error and request them to meet with Session in order that the matter might be Satisfactorily disposed of."

Hopewell, Aug. 7th 1866 The committee reported having failed to accomplish anything desirable in conference with those persons charged with knocking the door out of the North end of the Church. After exchanging views the Session resolved to postpone the case indefinitely. NOTE: For Story of The Church House Door, including participants, see E. E. Elliott's version, elsewhere among Hopewell papers. S. McQuiston to confer with John Douglass re Aug. 31st 1866 his request for a certificate. The following persons were received on personal examinations: MALIS-SA MARGARET RANKIN & ADALINE MCCLANNAHAN. Sept. 1st, 1866 "Reports being current that certain persons had violated the rules of this Church by dancing, Session resolved that each one should ascertain the facts in his own district and endeavor to reclaim the guilty and if they failed in this to notify them to refrain from Sealing ordainances untill they rendered Satisfaction." Sept. 30th 1866 Andrew Hamilton to attend Synod at Shilo, Ia. (Ind.) and Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery in First U.P. Church, Cincinnati.

Hopewell, Nov. 12th 1866 "..... After conference in reference to using the psalms authorised by the Assembly, Session resolved that the leaders of Singing be requested to let the Congregation know the psalm they may sing as a voluntary so that the Congregation can join in the exercise."

Hopewell, Nov. 26th 1866 "....After singing Psalm 127th, Elder Hugh McQuiston led in prayer." Received on personal examination: JULIA M. MARSHAL and FONETTA (NETTIE) C. HARPER. John Simpson to Presbytery at Hamilton.

Hopewell, Dec. 7th 1866 Received on personal exam: JOHN OWENS & MRS. SUSAN WILSON. Dr. Sloan appointed to confer with James and R. C. Hamilton in reference to reports of charging them with taking part in knocking out the door that was been closed in the north end of the Church. Mr. Elliott to confer with Israel Brown on the same matter and also to other reports injurious to his profession. Session then adjourned to meet after Devine Service tomorrow night.

Hopewell, Dec. 8th 1866 Dr. Sloan reported that the individuals above referred to confessed their fault, said they would guard against any error in their conduct. Israel Brown refused to make any confession and his case was deferred. Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Fair Haven.

Hopewell, April 16th 1867 "James F. Johnson said the reason that he had not applied for a Cirtificate before this was that he expected to locate Somewhere in the bounds of this Congregation but as that was not likely to be the case soon, he wished a Cirfificate. He also admitted his neglect of attendance on the Ordanances owing to his location." Hopewell, April 26th 1867 Received on certificate: LOUIS WILLIAMS & MARY, his wife, & MRS. NANCY J. WRIGHT & MRS. MARGARET H. GRAY. On personal examination: WILLIAM A. DOUGLASS & ISSABELLA DOUGLASS. June 9th 1867 Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery at Monroe. June 30th 1867 Robert Marshal to attend Presbytery in 1st U.P. Church in Cincinnati.

Hopewell, Aug. 30th 1867 The following persons were received on certificate: MRS. ELIZA H. SIMPSON, THEODORE SIMPSON, GEORGE W. SIMPSON AND JAMES M. McGEE on personal examination. (It is uncertain which were exam & certif.) Sept. 29th 1867 John Simpson to attend Second U. S. Synod of the West in Bellbrook. Oct. 15th 1867 Also to attend Presbytery in Dayton.

Hopewell, Dec. 3rd 1867 MARY JANE BELL was received on exam. Israel Brown expressed a desire to be restored to privileges. David M. Bonner stated that he been intoxicated and that he confessed he was Sorry for it and promised to refrain from this fault in the future. Report approved. Dr. Sloan to confer with James L. Brown and Kate Mann in reference to dancing.

<u>Hopewell, Dec. 6th, 1867</u> Israel Brown confessed that he was sorry that he had taken part in knocking the door out of the north end of the church and said he never would do the like again if he kept his senses and also that he was sorry that he had again engaged in dancing and would refrain from it in the future. Kate Mann acknowledged that she had danced and promised to refrain from this practice in the future.

Case against Israel Brown to be dropped. Clarissa & Mary Elizabeth Hamilton in reference to their violating our rules by dancing. <u>Dec. 7th 1867</u> Clarissa & Mary Elizabeth Hamilton both acknowledged that they had danced and promised to refrain from dancing in the future. "Elder Robert Marshall presented a request from his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Maggie Marshal being a member of the Old School Presbyterian Church, he stated that Session all knew her circumstances as well as he did, asking the privilege of Communing on tomorrow." Vote was negative.

Hopewell, Dec. 25th 1867 "Session had a conference in refference to the admission of members to Occasional Communion from other denominations. After a free exchange of opinion it was moved by Robert Marshall and seconded by Dr. Sloan that the application of Mrs. Marshall be granted. A record of the ayes and nays being called for the result was as follows--ayes, Robert Marshal, Dr. Sloan, Samuel B. Mc-Quiston & John Simpson; nays--Andrew Hamilton, Hugh Mc-Quiston & John Ramsey not voting. <u>Dec. 29th 1867</u> Dr. Sloan to attend first Presbytery in Sycamore Church. <u>Jan. 19th 1868</u> Subject of next meeting: What is the duty of a Session to their Pastor.

Hopewell, Feb. 3rd 1868 Thomas Buck wanted his vote from Dec. 25th changed from aye to nay. It was voted that that the action of Session in the case of Mrs. Marshall be reconsidered. Moved by Dr. Sloan and seconded by John Simpson that this Session will not entertain any application for privileges to Sealing ordanances outside of the U.P. Church. Decided in the negative.

Moved by Robert Marshall and seconded by John Simpson that the Pastor be requested to use at least one of the new version of the psalms each day in the public worship of God and that the pastor give notice to the Congregation previous to their introduction. Carried. Moved that a collection be taken by the Congregation to procure a Sufficient number of psalm books for the use of the Congregation. Carried. <u>March 31st 1868</u> John Buck to attend Presbytery at Unity Church (College Corner).

Hopewell, April 17th 1868 The case of Israel Brown was dismissed. The following persons were received on personal examination: SAMUEL F. COLESMITH, MICHAEL S. HOCKERSMITH, SAMUEL A. BUCK, SAMUEL H. BELL, JOHN CALVIN HERRON, ROBERT WILSON, ROBERT J. SIMPSON, HENRIETTA ELLIOTT, MAGGIE MC-QUISTON, VENOLIA SHAW.

Hopewell, April 18th 1868 reported that William Bell had been guilty of unchristian conduct by violently endeavoring to enforce authority in the school where his children were in attendance. Mr. Bell said he was Sorry and would be on his guard and not do the like again. June 14th 1868 John Ramsey to attend Presbytery in Richmond.

Hopewell, Aug. 3rd 1868 2 Elders to confer with William Bell in reference to a case of veracity. (Case later dismissed) One Elder to confer with G. C. Herron & others in reference to connection with Secret Associations. (This refers to the Odd Fellows in Fairhaven.)

Moved that Session accept the control of Sabbath School. Carried. <u>Sept. 13th 1868</u> Hugh Elliott to attend the Second U.P. Synod of the West in Piqua. <u>Oct. 4, 1868</u> Hugh McQuiston to attend Presbytery at Fairhaven. Hopewell, Oct. 27th 1868to confer with Michael S. Hockersmith re intoxication....inquire into validity of reports injurious to the Christian character of Robert Paxton, Jr. and Joseph Sloan....confer with James L. Brown re injurious reports to his Christian character.

Session unamimously agreed to endorce the action of the Youths Meeting of the Congregation to endow a Scholarship in Italy. Also recommended that the Youths appoint someone in each Elder's district to collect clothing or money to be sent to the Nashville Mission.

Hopewell, Nov. 4th 1868 Michael S. Hockersmith and Robert J. Simpson appeared before Session and acknowledged that they had been intoxicated and promised to refrain from a like Sin in the future. Case of Joseph Sloan dismissed. <u>Nov. 17th 1868</u> Robert Paxton, Jr. appeared before Session and acknowledged that he had been intoxicated and promised to refrain from a like Sin in the future.

Hopewell, Nov. 21st 1868 MRS. ELIZABETH MURRAY applied for admission, having a certificate from the Methodist Episcopal Church dated 1851, but was received on examination. THOMAS GRAHAM applied for privileges but as he expressed a difficulty in his mind in reference to Infant baptism, he was advised to wait for further light. <u>Dec. 8th 1868</u> Samuel B. McQuiston to attend Presbytery.

Hopewell, Feb. 11th 1869 Received on personal exami JOHN MARSHALL & REBEKAH, his wife. Committee to confer with Elmira Graham. Also with David Marshal re absenting himself from the public ordinances and with Andrew Kolar? for the same neglect. "Session Resolved that a roll of the members be kept and that any member absenting himself from a regular meeting will be required to give Satisfactory reasons for absence."

Hopewell,Mar.9th1869ElmiraGraham stated thatHervey Bell and Israel Brown had both danced at her houseand she had not approved it herself.Mar.30th1869Reported a conference with Israel Brown and Harvey Bellre dancing.Dismissed.Edler Hamilton to replace ThomasBuck to attend Presbytery.Conference with James Brown &Caroline, his wife, for neglect of public ordinances.

Hopewell, Apr. 23rd 1869 David Marshal had been attending the Reformed Church (Morning Sun Church, formerly called Beechwoods) except on communion Sabbaths and he had not decided to change his ecclesiastical connection with us but wished time to reflect. Dr. Sloan reported that Andrew Kohler expected to be more punctual in attending to the public ordinances. SAMUEL F. HOCKERSMITH received on personal examination. June 13th 1869 Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Hopewell.

Hopewell, Aug. 21st 1869 William Hamilton & wife came and he acknowledged that he had done a good many things wrong for which he was Sorry and wished to be restored. Granted. ...intimation of his restoration be publicly announced to Oct. 3rd 1869 the Congregation. David Robertson to attend Presbytery at Fairhaven. Oct. 10th 1869 Dr. Sloan appointed a delegate to Synod at Oxford. Nov 18th 1869 S. H. Bell confessed guilty to intoxication and was Nov. 26th 1869 A committee Sorry. Case dismissed. to confer with any who may have violated our rule by dancing.

Hopewell, Dec. 3rd 1869 A conference with Mary Jane and Maggie McCreary acknowledging that they had danced and promised to refrain from it in the future. The following persons were received on examination: ALBERT S. BROWN, JOHN C. BROWN, WILLIAM T. BROWN & ROBERT S. PAXTON. Dec. 4th 1869 "Dr. Sloan reported that Lizzie Foster said that all she had stated in refference to members of Session drinking beer was <u>only</u> hearsay and she did not wish to be understood as prefering charges against any one. Said Lizzie Foster acknowledged that she had violated our rule on dancing and promised to try and refrain in the future."

Hopewell, Jan. 21st 1870 The following persons were received on personal examination: WILLIAM HARMAN & MALICA, his wife, NEWTON LUCUS, JAMES HENRY BUSH, JOANNA BRISTO, NATHAN C. HARPER, GEORGE WALLACE, ROBERT A. DOUGLASS, IRENE C. HARPER & ELIZABETH J. SIMPSON. Mr. Hamilton to confer with Harvey Bell.

Hopewell, Feb. 5th 1870 The following persons were received on personal examination: DAVID C. RAMSEY & MARY S. RAMSEY, his wife, DAVID B. PAXTON, JAMES A. SLOAN, JOHN L. RANKIN, NATHAN M. WILSON, EVALINE F. WILSON, CLARA FOSTER, SARAH E. ELLIOTT & DAVID GRAY on certificate. Feb. 15th 1870 ... to confer with Lizzie Foster or her father (as they thought best) re her neglect of the Sealing April 3rd 1870 ordinance of the Supper. Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery in Hamilton. May 6th 1870 Report re Harvey Bell accepted, to be restored to privileges. Report on Lizzie Foster accepted.

Hopewell,May 7th 1870The following persons were re-ceived on personal examination:MRS. ANNA KEMPLE, MRS. HAN-NAH O. WILSON & NANCY C. BELL.On certificate MRS. REBECKAJ. CASKY.May 15th 1870a member.June 12th 1870Presbytery at Sycamore.Hugh McQuiston to attend

<u>Hopewell, Aug. 15th 1870</u> David Ramsey acknowledged intoxication and profane swearing and promised to refrain from these Vices in the future and try to live a better life. To confer with Robert Paxton re taking part at a dance at Mr. William Houston's. <u>Aug. 19th 1870</u> The interview with Robert Paxton satisfactory. Case dismissed. <u>Oct. 2nd 1870</u> Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery at Hopewell. Samuel B. McQuiston to attend Synod at Idaville, Indiana.

Hopewell, Nov. 18th 1870 NANCY ELIZABETH BELL received on examination. S. H. Bell did not appear for intoxication charges. David Ramsey denied intoxication but admitted use of profane language. Case dismissed.

Hopewell, Dec. 26th 1870 The following person was received on personal examination: LUCINDA JANE McGEE. David Ramsey and Harvey Bell to be conferred with.

Hopewell. April 11th 1871 The following persons were received on personal examination: MRS. ELIZABETH R. BELL, ALFRED SMITH, ELINDA SMITH. JAMES A. SLOAN was received back to membership on his certificate of dismission not having had an opportunity of using same. A committee to see James Hamilton in regard to having permitted a dance to be held in his house.

Hopewell, April 15th 1871 CATHERINE B. HAMILTON & JENNIE MARSHAL applied for membership and were received on personal examination. James Hamilton admitted that he had done wrong in permitting a dance to be held in his house. <u>Aug. 1st 1871</u> On motion William Caskey, Robert P. Gilmore, David Ramsey, Sr. & James A. Brown were nominated for the office of ruling elders. Edlers to be elected on Sat., Aug. 19th inst.

<u>Hopewell, Aug. 5th 1871</u> (this date is wrong or it was recorded late) David Ramsey, Wm. Caskey, Isaac L. McCracken & Samuel Paxton who were elected to the office of ruling elder at the meeting of the congregation, appeared before Session and declined to serve, giving as a reason for so Resolved 2nd That whenever Mr. Hamilton makes a satisfactory confession to this Session we will willingly give him a certificate.

Resolved 3rd That the Clerk be directed to furnish the 1st Presbytery of Ohio with a copy of the proceedings in the case of Mr. Hamilton. Wm. Caskey to attend next meeting of Presbytery.

Hopewell, June 9, 1882 James A. Brown was reelected Superintendant of Sabbath School without limitation of time.

Robert McQuiston was reelected Secretary and Treasurer of the Sabbath School.

On examination MARY E. RAMSEY and LYDIA MARTHA HAYS were received into membership.

June 10, 1882 IDA MAY YEAKLE and WILLIAM YEAKLE were received on examination; EDWARD PAXTON on certificate.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That we respectfully ask the 1st Presbytery of Ohio to instruct Mr. Andrew Hamilton to submit to the authority of Hopewell Session.

June 18, 1882 Wm. Caskey, James A. Brown and Hugh Ramsey to meet with the Committee appointed by the 1st Presbytery at Oxford on the 22nd of June 1882 for the purpose of settling the difficulty between Mr. Hamilton & Session.

<u>Hopewell. Sept. 19, 1882</u> Committee report is as follows: Your Committee respectfully report that it met with the Committee appointed by the 1st Presbytery of Ohio on the 22nd of June 1882 and accepted the following confession as a final settlement of the difficulty between Mr. Hamilton and the Session of Hopewell congregation.

Mr. Hamilton's paper: I hereby sincerely regret that I used language offensive to the Session of Hopewell at any of its meetings. And this I do to meet the resolution adopted by the said Session at its meeting Sept. 28, 1880 in which it refused me a certificate of Standing and dismission. This acknowledgement to be accepted by the Session in lieu of that requirement in said resolution. Oxford, June 22, 1882 (signed) Andrew Hamilton

On the 22nd day of June, Mr. ANDREW HAMILTON was granted and received a certificate of standing and dismissal to connect with Fair Haven congregation.

On the 3rd of Sept. certificates were granted to EDWARD PAXTON and MRS. FANNIE WILSON. ALEXANDER G. McDILL was granted a certificate to connect with the congregation of Springfield, Ohio. Church. ALBERT C. MAGEE, EVA J. MARSHALL & SARAH MARSHALL. (Caps have been added.)

Minutes of last meeting were read & approved. Thomas M. Buck, Clerk of Session, offered his resignation. On motion of Dr. Sloan his resignation was accepted & William Caskey elected Clerk of Session.

On motion of Dr. Sloan, Andrew Hamilton & William Caskey were appointed a committee to correct the church roll of members and report to Session.

On motion of John Ramsey, Dr. Sloan & James A. Brown were appointed a committee of confer with Mrs. Bristo, Miss Annetta Murray & Mrs. D. Ramsey for absenting themselves from the preaching of the word and report to Session.

On motion of Dr. Sloan, James A. Brown was appointed a committee to examine into charges made against Mrs. Nathan Foster by William Foster.

Adjourned with prayer by Andrew Hamilton to meet on Next Friday at 1 & 1/2 Oclock, P.M.

THE STORY OF THE OLD CHURCHYARD DOOR

by E. E. Elliott

References to this matter are in the Hopewell Session records of July 17 and Aug. 7, 1866 and Dec. 6, 1867.

Their names were Jim, John, Bill, Calvin and Charley Hamilton; Jim and Israel Brown; Harve and Andy Bell, only there is some doubt as to Andy.

They were all in some way related to each other and were known as members of the Clan Hamilton. Of course they were all Scotch-Irish, descendants of the families who had migrated from South Carolina to Ohio when the new territory was opened for settlement. The Browns were full cousins to the Hamiltons and the Bells were full cousins to all of them. The patriarch of the clan, who would have been called the chieftain if he had lived in his ancestral Scotland 300 years earlier, was old George Hamilton, but he didn't get into the mix-up himself and doesn't figure in the story except as head of the clan.

It was just after the finish of the War of the Rebellion (Civil War) and it is significant that all of these men had worn the uniform except Charley, who was a trifle too young to march when the others went. There were others in the clan who had marched who never came home again. This martial relationship is here related simply to show that military experience and training, supposed to develop a submissive habit of mind toward order and discipline, doesn't always work that way, but frequently the opposite. All of these boys were big chaps, a characteristic of the Hamilton blood, most of them were six feet or more, except the oldest brother, Jim, who made up this deficiency by being the leader by his force of character.

All of this should be helpful to an understanding of this strange story and the influence back of it.

Now this group, numerous as they were in this community, made up only a fraction of a large body of people who had migrated from the South to the North in the early years of the 19th century, chiefly because of their hatred of slavery. In their canvas-covered wagons they had brought their belongings, their household gear, their old world speech, their mental habits and above all, their religion, all of which rooted back through northern Ireland to the lochs and glens of Scotland. They were tenacious of their faith and determined in their convictions; almost the first thing these migrants had done when they reached the promised land of freedom and liberty, to which they had givien the name it still retains, "The Land of Israel"¹, was to get together and organize a congregation and build a meeting house of logs.

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In this church every family had its own place to sit. It would have been a breach of ecclesiastical decorum to have attempted to violate the traditions of the pews. If your family failed to attend the church service, the fact was evident to everyone there, as the vacant pew was mute evidence of that fact. Now the Hamiltons were conspicuous because of their size and numbers and the space they claimed as their own was in full view of everyone in the audience and hard by the famous entrance frequently referred to as "The Graveyard way". The Hamiltons lived over two miles from the church and as the roads were sometimes in bad condition, they were often a trifle late in arriving. They all came together in a comodious vehicle built something like a modern school bus. Usually they picked up along the way some of their relatives and the arrival was always an event. They would swing into their own stall in the horse sheds and falling in behind their old father, they would pass through the churchyard to the rear door and file in one by one and take their seats, always waiting for their occupancy, and in full view of the congregation. It was sometimes embarassing to the preacher who had to pause until the contingent had settled down. How long this had been going on no one could tell; it is likely for several generations since all the families reresented were of pioneer stock. It had gone on so long that it had become the usual and expected thing and the Hamiltons, like true Scotch-Irish, looked upon the procedure as an inalienable right and the business of no one else.

Then occurred the great event. To tell the rest of the story, I must pass from the general narrative to the specific and detailed account of a personal eye witness.

My father was one of the elders of the church, a member of the august session, as it was called, that ruled with true Scotch thoroughness. Our family pew was well toward the front and afforded a close-up view of the Hamilton reservation and the back entrance. I was but a little chap, a very little chap, who was keen to see everything that went on. I well remember the fascination of watching for that door to open and the family of big boys and girls to file in and settle down for the service, although I was but a five year old. Impressions on a child's consciousness are sure to remain in vivid perspective throughout later years.

I can see them yet as they came through the door. Old Uncle George Samuel, the two girls, the mother was not there for a marble slab nearby marked her resting place. Then came the five boys, in age and stature, men. Sometimes a cousin or other relatives might sit with them and just a few seats away other members of the clan used to sit; Elder Andy Hamilton himself, the various Browns, Bells, the Rocks. Perhaps it was the lingering spirit of interdependence of the ancient Highlands and it would even seem that the farther the migrant Scotch and Scotch-Irish wandered from their "ain countree", the more intensified became the racial traits. This group was not the only one in that psalm-singing congregation known as "brithers all". Now back to the story of the old back door: There came a Sabbath Day when, as the people assembled as usual and settled themselves for the service, that their eyes were immediately focussed on the Amen Corner. The graveyard door was missing; the outline was plainly to be seen but the space it had occupied was now filled in with brick and mortar. The Amen pews were still there but to the astonishment of all, they were vacant--the Hamiltons were not there. Whether they had come as usual, only to find their accustomed entrance barred and had then returned home or whether they had been appraised of the abandonment and had shown their displeasure by their absence was never known.

The congregation, undisturbed, worshiped as usual and gathered, as usual, under the old locust trees in front of the building and forgot the sermon in the momentous event and its possible consequences. Another week soon passed and this church's devoted people converged again from all points within the sphere of influence, on the old sanctuary at the usual time.

As each attendant arrived and tied his team in the horse sheds, he became aware that something had happened. There were excited groups at both front and rear of the church with the majority gathered at the rear. Right before their eyes was a scene of desolation and destruction. Where only the week before, the old entrance had passed into the discard through the agency of brick and mortar, there, in its place, was a gaping hole with an ungodly challenge to all the godly and law-abiding.

There, as I pushed to the inner circle of the surrounding ring, I saw the very implement of destruction, discarded and thrown to one side as no longer of use. It was a heavy beechen log, eight or ten feet long and almost a foot in diameter, a veritable battering ram, the primitive weapon of ancient fighting men against ancient gates and bars. No man alone could have lifted this log and done this evil deed. No two or three even could have had the physical strength to have done it, but a half dozen sturdy shoulders, lifting in unison and taking a run of half a dozen paces could and did, in a few moments, wreck the wall and undo all the work of a skilled bricklayer.

You could see that this dastardly attack against a sanctified edifice, built and devoted to public worship, had been timed with the purpose of affronting the church people to an extreme degree. The deed had been committed in the darkness of the late Saturday night or early Sabbath morning. The congregation would not have known of it until they gathered for church at eleven o'clock. No time was there to repair the damage or even to clear away the debris. The beech log had done the work effectively. The attack was not from within but from without the church.

That was always the way with battering rams. It must have been pushed with pent-up animosity as well as with physical force for the bricks to have been hurled far within and to have been scattered over pews and pulpit with the greatest disorder.

Along with other curious youngsters I took in the details of the destruction and mingled with the gaping crowd until the hour for service arrived and then slowly and reluctantly we passed through the big doors on the front and filed into our seats.

The minister found a cleared space behind the pulpit and took his stand while the excited congregation quieted down.

Just as the service was about to begin, a wave of astonishment swept through the audience as they saw filing through the wrecked entrance, the suspected perpetrators of the dastardly deed. One by one in single file, they picked their way through the broken mass of brick and mortar and took their usual seats in full view of the astonished congregation. All of my life long I have held that scene in my memory as a perfect illustration of the self control of the Scotch-Irish race. This was not the place and neither was it the time to be diverted from the sacred performance of the day.

The minister announced the Psalm, the leader of the music snapped his tuning fork and lifted the tune in which all joined lustily.

Not an allusion to the situation fell from the minister's lips as he preached his sermon. I have often wondered why he didn't abandon his text and use the occasion to deplore the powers of evil. He might have drawn on Bible history for many effective applications had he so chosen--Jericho's walls tumbling down or the destruction of the temple at Jerusalem, but that was not the Scotch-Irish way. The only suggestion that anything unusual had happened was the announcement of a meeting of the Session for the following day.

If that meeting was actually held or any action was taken then or afterwards I cannot say. If anything was done, the old Session records, which are still in existence, should reveal it. During the following week the door space was again filled in, the debris cleared away and a serious-minded congregation assembled as usual on the holy day and engaged in their customary services.

After long years I still ponder over the mysterious denouement of the strange affair. Evidently nothing punitive seemed to have taken place and today I wonder why. The outcome of this excapade was far out of the ordinary run of misdemeanors for it was an act of sacrilege, punishable by both the rule of the church and the law of the land, yet neither seemed to have entered into the case. Certain factors and deductions may be suggested. The Hamilton group included a large number of church members and supporters. They were descendants of original pioneers and old-timers. The participant in this outrage were all young men knit together by the ties of kinship. To have excommunicated any or all of the miscreants would have created a breach among the members that would have worked immense harm. Another powerful but sentimental reason may be given:

Practically all of these young men were returned soldiers. Some of them had seen comrades fall at Vicksburg or had marched with other neighbor-boys with Sherman. Soldier comradeship is binding and there were scores in that assembly who had fought together, and in the old cemetery at the rear were the mounds and monuments of many who had given their lives for the same causes that had led their ancestors out of the land of the slave to the land of the freeman.

There had been no real hostility to the church in the escapade, no antagonism to authority. Rather it was a demonstration against the interference with personal rights and privileges, that spirit that has checked oppression and maintained liberty more than once during our national career.

Perhaps the boys carried their demonstration beyond the bounds of decency and reason but in the long run there had been nurtured in the hearts and minds of these people a spirit of tolerance willing to close their minds to intolerance and allow a possible cause for injury to fall into desuetude and forgetfulness. And it was well. For one thing, the ties that knit the Hamilton clan together began to slacken. One by one, the boys married and set up homes of their own. Jim Brown had already taken a separate pew in the church with his Israel Brown located on the farm down on the hills bride. of Four Mile Creek. Bill Hamilton got interested in some of the developments in farming machinery and became something of a celebrity. Calvin who had shouldered his rifle when only sixteen, redeemed himself by graduating from the University (Miami) and entering the ministry. Charley, six feet tall at fourteen, later migrated to a western state where he married and became an estimable citizen.

And so with the cousin, John Hamilton, whose father belonged to the Session of the church. I can see him yet, as a year later, awkward and red-faced, he ushered his bride into his father's family pew which adjoined our own.

Before this, Harve Bell had been called to account for his drinking habits but time passed and he became an exemplary and active man in the church circles. Among his descendants today are to be found ministers of the gospel and professional men of the highest character and standing.

I mentioned the vivid and lasting impression made on my childish mind by the story here related. This written account may serve to preserve it, as there are but few living witnesses The Hamilton group included a large number of church members and supporters. They were descendants of original pioneers and old-timers. The participant in this outrage were all young men knit together by the ties of kinship. 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I mentioned the vivid and lasting impression made on my childish mind by the story here related. This written account may serve to preserve it, as there are but few living witnesses

of that scene of desecration today.

The participants are all gone. Most of them are sleeping in the old churchyard hard by the scene of their midnight raid three quarters of a century ago. Each Decoration Day the memorial flags beside the marble markers wave their story of remembrance, not of the old abandoned door whose outline in the wall is still to be seen, but of patriotic services and useful careers, placed there by the friendly and loving hands of those who can both remember and forget.

Footnote: "E. E. Elliott, son of Hugh Elliott, grandson of Ebenezer Elliott, graduated Monmouth College, farmed several years and then went West--was a Professor in Univ. of,Idaho. His wife sent me several papers about events in Israel Twp. E. E. was born on Elliott farm, SE of Morning Sun, Ohio. --Ila Lemon"

NOTE: Edwin Ebenezer Elliott was born Oct. 16, 1860 and was over 75 years old when this was written. "Three quarters of a century ago." His florid style of rhetoric dates back to his youth; it was a form also favored by the Clerks of Session of Hopewell Church.

It is curious that in this lengthy narrative Mr. Elliott at no time identifies the church. It is indeed Hopewell Church.

The history of The Incident: From the records of Hopewéll Church Congregational Meetings, April 23, 1866, "Trustees instructed to close the door in the North end of the church. Trustees alsoinstrusted to prosecute any one who disturbs the congregation while worshiping". Jan. 28, 1867 (after The Incident), "....the prosecution of disturbers in meeting was ordered stricken out of minutes of April 23, 1866."

The Hopewell Church Session, which had its own judicial system and had suspended members for "refusal to stop the practice of dancing", took an amazingly tolerant stand. At their meeting the following day, there was general discussion and the usual committee was formed to investigate.

At the following meeting, the committee reported failure to find evidence and the matter was tabled indefinitely. It was not entirely forgotten for almost a year and a half later, the Session got a belated confession from Harvey Bell.

Subject: SESSION RECORDS, 1872-1916 INCLUDES BAPTISMS, ADMISSION AND DISMISSALS (INCOMPLETE) Hopewell, Sept. 2, 1672 "The Session met and was constituded with prayer by the Moderator (Rev. McHatton). Members present: Rev. Joseph McHatton, John Ramsey, Andrew Hamilton, Dr. (Richard) Sloan, Hugh Elliott, David Ramsey, Thomas M. Buck, James A. Brown and William Caskey.

On examination and profession of their faith in Christ the following persons were received into membership of this congregation: ALBERT C. MAGEE, EVA J. MARSHALL and SARAH MAR-SHALL.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Thomas M. Buck, Clerk of Session, offered his resignation which was accepted. And William Caskey was elected Clerk of Session.

Andrew Hamilton and William Caskey were appointed a committee to correct the Church roll of members and report to the Session.

Dr. Sloan and James A. Brown were appointed a committee to confer with Mrs. Bristo, Miss Annetta Murray and Mrs. D. Ramsey for absenting themselves from the preaching of the word and report to the Session.

James A. Brown was appointed a committee to investigate charges made against Mrs. Nathan Foster by William Foster and report to the Session.

Adjourned to meet Sept. 6, at half past one Oclock P.M. Prayer by Andrew Hamilton."

**(Hereafter, all Minutes of Hopewell Session will be condensed and limited to the historic and human interest aspects of these records. Unless noted, the members of Session will be the same persons listed above. In the next meeting, Sept. 6th, it took 12 lines to identify all present, etc. and to learn that there was no business to transact.)

Hopewell, Sept. 6, 1872 No business to transact. Sept. 7, 1872 EMMA L. RAMSEY was received on examination. James A. Brown reported the charges made against Mrs. Nathan Foster to be false.

Hopewell, Oct. 7, 1872 James A. Brown to be delegate to Synod. David Ramsey reported an interview with Tamison Duvall. She is now a member of the United Brethern Church. The Session therefore ruled that her name be erased from the roll.

The Clerk of Session was granted an order to draw on the treasurer of the Contingent fund to the amount of five dollars to pay for a book in which to keep the minutes of Session and church records. **(Note: It is that book that is now being copied. There is much space at the back of the book for data on church members.)

Dr. Sloan and Wm. Caskey were appointed a committee to endeavor to Secure the missing records of the Session. (They were unsuccessful. The preceding Book of Session Minutes, May, 1850-Sept., 1872, was found in a sale of old books and is now privately owned.)

Hopewell, Nov. 25, 1872 Certificates of dismission were granted to MRS. JANE HERRON, JOHN C. HERRON and NARCISSA HERRON, his wife. And also on Sept. 30th, to THOMAS M. BUCK and MARGARET BUCK, his wife, and to ISAAC L. McCRACKEN and ELLEN McCRACKEN, his wife. Jan. 6, 1873 Hugh, Elliott to attend Presbytery at Hamilton, Ohio.

Hopewell, Jan. 17, 1873 The committee on correction of the Church roll of members reported. The Clerk instructed to incorporate the roll of church members and of the ruling Elders into the records of Session. The roll to contain the names of all who have acted as ruling Elders in Hopewell Congregation from its organization to the present time. Elders John Ramsey and Dr. Sloan were late.

The following persons were received: On certificate, MRS. MARGARET GILMORE, on examination FRANCES M. RAMSEY.

Hopewell, Jan. 18, 1873 John Marshall offered his resignation as leader of the Congregational Singing. On motion he was requested to continue until the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

Hopewell. Feb. 23, 1873 Certificates of dismission were granted to WILLIAM R. MARSHALL and SARAH MARSHALL, his wife. A congregational prayer and conference meeting was appointed to be held on the first Tuesday of every month at two Oclock P.M. <u>Feb. 24, 1873</u> No business.

Hopewell, Mar. 11, 1873 Session Spent a Short time in devotional exercises after which the following paper was adopted:

Whereas Dancing is not promotive to the glory of God, nor the Salvation of Souls, And unfits those who engage in it for the right discharge of duties which they owe to God; And their fellow men. And has caused the circulation of reports detrimental to the cause of Christ, therefore:

Resolved 1st That dancing is inconsistent with the teachings of the word of God, And the practice of this congregation, And members are earnestly entreated to desist therefrom.

Resolved 2nd That we request heads of families to assist us in this duty by refusing to permit dancing in their houses.

Resolved 3rd That we use our influence in a private way to remedy this evil.

Elder Andrew Hamilton was appointed a delegate to Presbytery.

Hopewell, April 1, 1873 The Members of Session and the teachers of the Sabbath School held a conference and appointed the 2nd Sabbath of April to open and reorganize the School.

Hopewell, Apr. 15, 1873 The committee to confer with Mrs. David C. Ramsey, Miss Annetta Murray and Mrs. Bristo reported. Report accepted and the committee discharged. April 25, 1873 The following persons were received into membership: On certificate, RICHARD E. SLOAN; on examination, EMMA P. PAXTON.

Hopewell, June 13, 1873 Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Hopewell. James A. Brown and Wm. Caskey to represent the Congregation before Presbytery and answer Such questions as Presbytery will propose to them concerning the Spiritual interests of the congregation.

Hopewell, Aug. 5, 1873 It was reported at a previous meeting of Session that Miss Annetta Murray is a member of the Campbellite Church. Therefore resolved that her name be erased from our roll. Elder James A. Brown was late.

Hopewell, Aug. 26, 1873 Certificates of dismission were granted to ALBERT C. MAGEE, ELIZA BROWN & MARGARET BROWN. And also in April to JAMES I. FARIS & WIFE.

On motion our pastor was requested to read the preamble and resolutions on dancing to the congregation at some suitable time.

James A. Brown was appointed to confer with James H. Bush in regard to unchristian conduct and neglect of the ordinance of the Lord's Supper. William Caskey to confer with Mr. and Mrs. Harmon in regard to neglect of ordinances.

Hopewell, Aug. 27, 1873 Elders John Ramsey, James A. Brown, Hugh Elliott and Andrew Hamilton were late for the meeting. The following persons were received into membership: On certificate, ROBERT J. MILLER, MRS. MARIA FOSTER and GRIZZELL McDILL; on examination, CAROLINE M. ELLIOTT, SARAH F. BROWN & EMMA J. ANDERSON. <u>Aug. 30, 1873</u> SAMUEL McHATTON was received on examination. <u>Oct. 5, 1873</u> Hugh Elliott to attend Presbytery at Sycamore. <u>Oct. 12th</u> Andrew Hamilton to attend meeting of Synod at Princeton, Indiana.

Hopewell, Dec. 28, 1873 Session agreed to have the ordinance of the Lord's Supper administered Sometime during the month of January, 1874. James A. Brown to attend Presbytery at Cincinnati, Ohio.

Hopewell, Jan. 18, 1874 ADA E. MOREN was received on examination. Jan. 27, 1874 Committee to confer with Mr. and Mrs. Harmon reported and were discharged. Committee to confer with James H. Bush requested to be relieved from duty. Granted.

The following questions were proposed for discussion:

1st. Is it worshiping God to Sing psalms at Sabbath School celebrations?

2nd. Should we require applicants for admission to membership in this congregation to give their assent to the principles of the United Presbyterian Church?

Hopewell, Jan. 30, 1874 The following persons were received on examination: WILLIAM H. MARSHALL, MRS. AMELIA MARSHALL, ELLIE R. MARSHALL, MATHEW H. MARSHALL, JOSEPH L. MARSHALL, GEORGE W. MANN & LEWIS CORNGABLE. Mar. 1, 1874 Certificates of dismission were granted to MRS. REBECCA MAGEE, JAMES M. MAGEE & LUCINDA J. MAGEE. Apr. 5, 1874 Andrew Hamilton to attend Presbytery at Monroe, Ohio.

Hopewell, April 14, 1874 Certificates of dismission were granted to MARY A. WALLACE & GEORGE G. WALLACE. Also to ROBERT PATTERSON & FRANCES PATTERSON, his wife. Hugh Elliott soon appeared and took his Seat.

The Sabbath School teachers of last year were reappointed for the coming year. Mrs. R. J. Caskey offered her resignation as teacher which was accepted, and Miss Sallie Wilson was appointed to fill her place. Miss Clara Brown was appointed to teach the class formerly taught by Mrs. Faris.

Hopewell, April 28, 1874 The following persons were received on examination: HARRY Y. FOSTER, WILLIAM M. BROWN, and DAVID R. SHAW. John Ramsey was appointed to confer with Benjamin Foster and James A. Brown to confer with Nathan Foster in reference to the neglect of having the ordinance of baptism administered to their children.

John Ramsey to confer with Jame H. Bush and David Ramsey to confer with Mr. and Mrs. Harmon with reference to neglecting the word and ordinances of God's house.

Hopewell, May 1, 1874 Members present, David Ramsey and William Caskey. John Ramsey and Andrew Hamilton soon appeared. About half an hour after Session was constituted Hugh Elliott and James A. Brown appeared.

The following persons were admitted into membership: on examination, MARGARET J. GRAHAM, ELIZA E. McCLENAHAN and ANNIE E. BROWN; on certificate, JAMES NEWTON.

At the request of John Ramsey, James H. Bush appeared before Session and gave his reasons for neglecting the ordinance of the Lord's Supper. After some conversation with Session, his difficulties appeared to be removed for the present.

David Ramsey reported an interview with Mr. and Mrs. Harmon. Their case was laid over for the present.

Committee to confer with Benjamin Foster reported that Mr. Foster promised to have the ordinance of baptism administered to his children, if they were willing, as soon as convenient.

Hopewell, June 14, 1874 Certificates of dismission were granted to J. M. ANDERSON & EMMA J. ANDERSON, his wife. July 14, 1874 Elder James A. Brown reported that Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Foster would have their children baptized Soon. Whereas, reports have come to Session derogatory to the Christian character of James H. Bush (drunkenness and using profane language) that he be, and hereby is, suspended from the privileges of the Church. Cited to appear before Session to answer the charges reported against him. Adjourned to meet Sabbath evening after Sermon.

Hopewell, July 19, 1874 After Sermon, Session met to hear the report in the case of James H. Bush and it was reported that his whereabouts could not be ascertained.

Hopewell, July 28, 1874 Committee reported that James H. Bush could not be found. Whereas, Session having twice endeavored to cite Mr. Bush to appear and answer to the charges against him but failed because of his absence, therefore, Resolved, that the action of Session in the case of James H. Bush be publicly announced to the congregation on next Sabbath. Which was done by the Moderator.

Elder David Ramsey was appointed a Committee to confer with Mr. and Mrs. Harmon and request them to appear before Session and give their reasons for absenting themselves from the public ordinances of God's house.

**(Mr. and Mrs. Harmon and Mr. Bush were some of the "colored persons" in the Hopewell congregation.)

Hopewell, Sept. 1, 1874 David Ramsey reported an interview with Mrs. Harmon and requested her and her husband to appear before Session but they did not appear. Their case was laid on the table for the present. Dr. Sloan to attend Presbytery at Hopkinsville, Ohio.

Hopewell, Sept. 4, 1874 The following persons were received on examination: WILLIAM F. BADER, MARY R. BADER, his wife, ROBERT M. WILSON & MARY F. HAMILTON.

Hopewell, Sept. 5, 1874 JOHN A. MANN was received on examination. The hour for Services in the church having arrived, the Moderator requested Dr. Sloan to take the chair. After which the following action was taken by the Session.

Whereas, our pastor is not in the enjoyment of good health at present, therefore

Resolved, That we the members of Hopewell Session, recommend that the congregation grant him a vacation. Our pastor to decide what time would be most suitable for him, and the congregation to decide the length of the vacation.

A congregational meeting was called immediately after Services and the above action was read by the Clerk to the congregation. <u>Oct. 11, 1874</u> William Caskey to attend Synod at Spring Hill, Indiana.

Hopewell, Jan. 3, 1875 A certificate of dismission was granted to ROBERT S. PAXTON. John Ramsey to attend Presbytery at College Corner. <u>Mar. 14, 1875</u> A certificate of dismission was granted to MRS. ISABELLA IRWIN, formerly ISABELLA DOUGLASS.

<u>Hopewell, March 16, 1875</u> James A. Brown to confer with William Ramsey in reference to his absenting himself from the public ordinances of God's house and also to the report of his being several times intoxicated.

John Ramsey appointed to cite Mr. William Harmon to appear before Session.

Hopewell, Mar. 23, 1875 James A. Brown reported a conference with Wm. S. Ramsey. His reason for nonattendance on public ordinances was that he applied for his certificate over a year ago but did not receive it; and also in reference to the report of his being intoxicated, he replied, "If you can prove it, go ahead".

Hugh Elliott appointed to hold further conference with Wm. S. Ramsey and try to persuade him to return to his duty.

John Ramsey reported that he served the citation on Mr. Wm. Harman but he failed to appear. Wm. Caskey to cite him again.

Whereas the Moderator of this Session notified the congregation at the late annual meeting held Jan. 25th that he would offer his resignation of the Pastoral charge of Hopewell congregation at the next meeting of Presbytery, therefore, Resolved. That we request a meeting of the congregation to take whatever action they may think proper in this case.

Hopewell, Apr. 5, 1875 John Ramsey, as usual, was late. Hugh Elliot reported an interview with Wm. S. Ramsey who denied the intoxication charge and said he would like to attend church. Report accepted.

Andrew Hamilton was appointed a delegate to attend the meeting of Presbytery at Hopewell on April 6th at 2 P.M.

Jas. A. Brown to confer with Mr. Peter Kemple about a report of his being intoxicated about a year ago at College Corner, and if he denies the reported charge, the committee will investigate the matter.

Hugh McQuiston to ascertain what evidence there is (if any) to prove the report of Wm. S. Ramsey being intoxicated.

William Caskey to cite Wm. Harmon and also Mrs. Melissa Harmon to appear before Session.

<u>Hopewell</u>, Apr. 27, 1875 At the late meeting of the 1st Presbytery of Ohio at Hopewell, April <u>7</u>th 1875, Rev. Joseph McHatton was released from the Pastoral charge of Hopewell congregation.

A paper was received from Morning Sun congregation inviting Hopewell congregation to unite with them and build a church at Morning Sun.

Wm. Caskey and Andrew Hamilton were appointed a committee to inquire into the purpose of the paper.

The Committee submitted the following to the Session which was approved and sent to the Morning Sun congregation.

"To the members of the Morning Sun congregation. The Session of Hopewell respectfully make the following inquiry. Is it your desire to immerge the two congregations into one before you commence building your house of worship."

Hopewell, May 10, 1875 The Session of Morning Sun was invited to meet with the Session of Hopewell and hold a conference as to the practicability of uniting the two congregations.

Hopewell, May 15, 1875 Members present from Morning Sun congregation: James Cook, William McCreary and Samuel B. McQuiston. Members of Hopewell: John Ramsey, Hugh Elliott, Hugh McQuiston, David Ramsey, James A. Brown and William Caskey.

Resolved That we the members of Morning Sun congregation propose to the members of Hopewell congregation to unite with us in building a church at Morning Sun. Signed John Wright, Char

ned John Wright, Char John C. McDill, Sec

After discussing the above proposition, both Sessions expressed a desire for the union of the two congregations, providing they could be united Satisfactorily.

The following resolution was then passed. That we call a meeting of the congregation on Saturday before the Communion immediately after Services to consider the proposition from Morning Sun congregation.

Resolved That we invite the Morning Sun congregation to unite with us in the celebration of the Lord's Supper on the 4th Sabbath of May.

After hearing a letter read from M. M. Brown stating the condition and wants of Lincoln College, Session ordered a collection to be taken next Sabbath week for said College.

James A. Brown to attend Pres-Hopewell, June 13, 1875 bytern at Dayton, Ohio. Session to invite Rev. H. P. Jackson to administer the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the 4th Sabbath of August. Aug. 20, 1875 Rev. H. P. Jackson, Moderator pro tem. Certificate of Standing was granted EVA J. JOHNSTON, formerly MARSHALL, to connect with Morning Sun congregation. David Ramsey to attend Synod at Aug. 29, 1875 Bellefontaine, Ohio. Session met and granted a certificate of dismission to connect with the Oxford congregation, Ohio, to MRS. GRIZZELL McDILL. Granted a certificate of dismission to Sept. 19, 1875 ROBERT WILSON to connect with a Sister congregation at Monmouth, Ill.

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Hopewell, Sept 26, 1875 bytery at Fair Haven. Sufficient evidence to prove the charge of intoxication against Peter Kemple. Case dismissed.

Dr. Sloan to confer with David C. Ramsey regarding intoxication and neglecting the public ordinances of God's house. A certificate of dismission was granted J. C. HAMILTON.

Hopewell, Nov. 5, 1875 Resolved, That Wm. Harmon and Melissa, his wife, be and hereby are Suspended from the Sealing ordinances of God's house, till they return from the error of their way and give evidence of repentance.

Wm. S. Ramsey refused to appear before Session and said that he did not consider himself a member of the church. Resolved, That Wm. S. Ramsey be and hereby is Suspended from the Sealing ordinances of God's house, till he returns from the error of his way and gives evidence of repentance.

The Clerk was instructed to notify Wm. S. Ramsey, Wm. Harmon and Melissa, his wife, of the action of Sessior in their cases.

Dr. Sloan reported that he did not confer with David C. Ramsey, but saw him several times under the influence of liquor and heard him use profane language. He too was suspended.

Hugh McQuiston was appointed to confer with Louis Williams in regard to neglecting the public ordinances of the church and report to Session.

Hopewell,Nov. 21, 1875Received on certificate, THOMASMcQUISTON.Dec. 4, 1875Received on examination,CHARLES H. HOCKERSMITH.Dec. 19, 1875Dr. Sloanto attend Presbytery at Hamilton, Ohio.Dec. 26, 1875SAMUEL A. BUCK received on certificate.Certificates of dis-mission were granted to MRS.MARGARET BUCK, JOHN P. BUCK, &MINERVA J. BUCK, his wife, and MARGARET A. BUCK.Also toISRAEL H. GRAY and HATTIE GRAY, his wife, and D. A. GRAY &MARY ANN GRAY.

Hopewell, Jan. 16, 1876Certificates of dismission weregranted to HUGH B. RAMSEY, MARTHA C. RAMSEY, FRANCES M. RAM-SEY, DAVID RAMSEY, MARY RAMSEY, FANNIE I. GILMORE & MATILDABERNARD.Jan. 23, 1876A certificate of dismis-sion was granted to CLARA WRIGHT, formerly CLARA FOSTER.

Hopewell, Feb. 16, 1876 A certificate of dismission was granted to MRS. MARY A. WHITE, formerly MARY BROWN.

Committee appointed to confer with Mr. Louis Williams reported that Mr. Williams' horse died some time ago and it was too far for he and his family to walk to church, but said they would attend preaching as soon as they could get another horse. Report accepted. <u>Mar. 19, 1876</u> Wm. Caskey to attend Presbytery at Dayton, Ohio.

Hopewell, March 26, 1876 A certificate of dismission was granted to MRS. JOSEPH SIMPSON. And also on Apr. 2nd to MR. ANDREW B. GRAY & MARGARET GRAY, his wife.

<u>Apr. 9, 1876</u> A certificate of dismission was granted to MRS. EVALINE F. GILMORE, formerly EVALINE WILSON.

<u>June 11, 1876</u> Andrew Hamilton to attend Presbytery at Richmond, Indiana. <u>June 27, 1876</u> Whereas Mrs. Bristo has for over a year neglected the public ordinances Resolved, That her name be dropped from our roll.

Whereas Wm. Harmon and Melissa, his wife, have been suspended ed since Nov. 5, 1875 and are at present living outside of the bounds of this congregation, Resolved, that their names be dropped from our roll.

Dr. Sloan to confer with Mrs. Mary S. Ramsey and ascertain why she does not attend church.

Hopewell, July 25, 1876 Dr. Sloan reported that Mary S. Ramsey said we would like to attend church and that her husband had promised to take her but always found some excuse for not fulfilling his promise. She said when there would be preaching in town that she expected to go and take her children with her.

Hugh Elliott and Dr. Sloan to investigate reports in circulation injurious to the Christian character of David R. Shaw.

The Clerk was instructed to ask W. H. French, D.D. to administer the Lord's Supper at Hopewell some time during the month of August.

Hopewell, Aug. 8, 1876 Dr. Sloan reported that he found evidence strong enough to convince him that David R. Shaw is guilty of using profane language.

John Ramsey reported that he talked with Hervy Bell who acknowledged that he had been intoxicated and promised that he would endeavor to do his duty, in the future and that he hoped it would be the last time that he would ever be intoxicated. Session was Satisfied with his statement.

Mr. Hamilton and James A. Brown to investigate reports injurious to the Christian character of Samuel R. Brown. <u>Hopewell, Aug. 17, 1876</u> Mr. Hugh McQuiston to confer with David R. Shaw and if he would not promise to quit using profane language and return to his duty to request him to abstain from Sealing Ordinances until further action is taken in his case.

Andrew Hamilton and James A. Brown reported that they found evidence sufficient to Satisfy them that Samuel R. Brown has been guilty of using profane language and also of the Sin of Sabbath desecration and intoxication. At first he admitted the charges but afterwards when Specifications were made he would neither admit nor deny.

Hopewell, Aug. 19, 1876 Dr. Sloan and Hugh Elliott were late. The following persons were admitted on examination: JOHN WILSON PAXTON and IDA A. GRAY.

Conferred with David R. Shaw who admitted that he had been guilty of using profane language but would refrain from it in the future. He expressed his Sorrow for the past and said he would try to do his duty and live a Christian life. Report accepted as Satisfactory and the case dismissed.

Hopewell, Aug. 20, 1876 The following persons were received into membership: on certificate, MARY C. McDILL and MRS. E. HAMILTON; on examination, SARAH MELISSA BROWN and MATTIE MURRAY. The latter was admitted to the ordinance of baptism.

Hopewell, Sept. 17, 1876 Andrew Hamilton to attend Synod at Hamilton. JONATHAN T. ATKINS was received on certificate.

Certificates of dismission were granted for MARGARET GILMORE and JAMES I. GILMORE to connect with Fair Haven congregation. Elder Hugh McQuiston to attend Presbytery at Monroe. Certificates of dismission were granted to LOUIS WILLIAMS and MARY WILLIAMS, his wife, on Nov. 12th 1876.

Hopewell, Dec. 24, 1876 William Caskey was appointed a delegate to attend the approaching meeting of Presbytery to meet at Cincinnati on the first Tuesday of Jan. 1877.

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**(Note: On Jan. 31, 1876, the resolution to unite with the Morning Sun congregation lost by a single vote: 32 against, 31 for. At the same meeting, they amended the Constitution of Hopewell Church to allow ALL members to vote instead of heads of households only. In 1876 there were a reported 216 members, yet only 63 voted. In 1877 there were a reported 96 members.)

(The spirit of the resolution differed sharply from the amiable semi-agreement between the Hopewell and Morning Sun Sessions reported heretofore by William Caskey, Session Clerk. The resolution read: "Resolved, That we build a new church and locate it in Morning Sun and continue the name Hopewell and invite the members of the Morning Sun congregation to unite with us and assist in building the church".)

At a meeting of the Session of the Morning Sun congregation held Jan. 12, 1877 it was decided that David R. Shaw who was certified with others from the Session of Hopewell, cannot be received as a member of this congregation until there is an investigation by the Session of Hopewell of certain reports derogatory to his Christian character and Standing.

Hopewell, Jan. 20, 1877 "The Clerk was instructed to send the following paper to the Session of Morning Sun.

Wheras, there are no charges on our book against David R. Shaw and the reports in circulation derogatory to his Christian character did not come to our knowledge in time for investigation before granting the certificates asked for. And wheras, we certified him to the Session of Morning Sun stating that there were reports in circulation derogatory to his Christian character (The case was dismissed Aug. 19, 1876) therefore,

Resolved 1st That David R. Shaw is dismissed from the Hopewell congregation.

Resolved 2nd That the matter now rests entirely between the Session of Morning Sun and David R. Shaw."

Hopewell, Aug. 10, 1877 Session met at the Session house and was constituted with prayer by Rev. John Anderson, Moderator, pro tem. The following persons were received on examination: ARTHUR A. GRAHAM, JAMES M. ALLEN, CHARLES R. McDILL, NANCY C. PAX-TON, MELVINA J. McMILLAN, MARTHA J. BELL, IDA M. BROWN, and MARY MARSHALL. <u>Aug. 11th</u> ROBERT McQUISTON received on certificate. WILLIAM M. PAXTON received on examination.

Charges injurious to the Christian character of Wm. T. Brown having come to the knowledge of Session, he was notified to refrain from Sealing ordinances till the charges could be investigated.

Hopewell, Aug. 22, 1877 Samuel R. Brown appeared and acknowledged that he had used profane language and desecrated the Sabbath day. He promised relying upon God for Strength to forsake his Sins and live a Christian life.

Wm. T. Brown appeared and promised to live a Christian life, relying upon God for Strength. Both brethern requested the prayers of the congregation on their behalf. And were willing that the above should be read from the pulpit.

James A. Brown to attend Synod at Bloomington, Indiana on Sept. 27, 1877. William Caskey to attend Presbytery at Unity (College Corner), Indiana on Sept. 25, 1877.

Hopewell, Dec. 1, 1877 (Written in the margin: "Rev. J. C. Campbell accepted the call from Hopewell and took charge of the congregation on the first Sabbath of October, 1877. But was not installed till March 26, 1878.")

Session met at the Session house and was constituted with prayer by the Mod., Rev. J. C. Campbell.

Resolved, That Session request the Superintendent and teachers of the Sabbath School to continue the School till the Annual Meeting of the congregation and then let the congregation decide whether the School shall be continued or closed during the remainder of the winter.

Resolved, That in the judgment of this Session, the election of three additional members is necessary.

Resolved, That Monday after our communion be appointed for election of Elders.

Resolved, That Session make no nominations.

Resolved, That Andrew Hamilton be appointed to attend Presbytery at Hamilton on Dec. 17, 1877.

Hopewell, Jan. 11, 1878 The following persons were received on examination: EMMA BROWN and MAGGIE J. RAMSEY. On certificate: ELIZA JANE CAMPBELL, MARY G. CAMPBELL, MAR-GERET C. CAMPBELL, SARAH B. DALES CAMPBELL, JOSEPH C. STEEL, MARY J. STEEL, MARTHA PAXTON, WILLIAM HAYS, ELIZABETH JANE HAYS & CAROLINE MCDILL.

Certificates of dismissions were granted to JENNIE BROWN to connect with Morning Sun congregation and also to ROBERT P. GILMORE & RACHEL C. GILMORE to connect with Unity (College Corner) congregation. Recess to meet at call of Mod'r.

According to previous arrangements the election for Ruling Elders was held on Monday after Communion Jan, 14th which resulted in the election of William Bell, Hugh Ramsey and Andrew B. Rock. Public notice was given to the congregation that these brethern would be ordained in due time providing no lawful objections be laid in against them.

<u>March 12th.</u> A certificate of dismission was granted to DAVID C. RAMSEY to connect with Morning Sun congregation.

Hopewell, Feb. 12, 1878 Wm. Bell, Hugh Ramsey and Andrew B. Rock the Elders elect were examined as to the acceptance of the office. Their view in undertaking it and their qualifications for it and also on dicipline. The examination was Sustained. The congregation to be notifed on next Sabbath of their acceptance of the office of Ruling Elder, accompanied by the edict. The time of their ordination left to the discretion of the Moderator.

The committee to confer with David C. Ramsey reported that Mr. Ramsey expressed his Sorrow for his Sin and promised relying upon God for Strength to try and do better in the future. Report accepted. (Footnote: "Resolved, That David C. Ramsey be and hereby is restored to the priviledges of the church."[This resolution should have been inserted in the above minutes. Wm. Caskey, Clerk]" The above-listed March 12th dismission of David C. Ramsey to the Morning Sun church seems to have been a misplaced footnote.)

Hopewell. Feb. 26, 1878 On Sabbath Feb. 24th, The Moderator announced to the congregation that the Elders elect would be ordained on Tuesday, Feb. 26th. Services to begin at 11 o,clock. On the day appointed the congregation met, and the Session was constituted with prayer by the Moderator. After a very instructive Sermon by Rev. J. F. Black of Oxford on Spiritual growth, the Elders elect were ordained to the office of Ruling Elders by prayer and the laying on of the hands of the Session.

Hugh Ramsey to attend Presbytery at Hopewell Feb. 26, 1878.

Hopewell, March 30, 1878 Session made out the following list of officers and teachers and made arrangements to reorganize the Sabbath School on the first Sabbath of April. Superintendant James A. Brown Secretary David. B. Paxton Treasurer Albert McDill

Teachers: William Bell, Hugh Ramsey, Andrew B. Rock, Samuel M. Paxton, Samuel Graham, Wm. Caskey, Andrew N. McClenahan, Nathan L. Ramsey, Nancy C. Bell, Mattie Paxton, Lizzie Hamilton, Lizzie Harper, Martha A. McQuiston, Isabel Graham, Margaret McQuiston, Melvina J. McMillan, Eliza J. Campbell, Mary G. Campbell, Mattie Ramsey and Mary A. Paxton.

<u>April 21st</u> MRS. F. ELLEN BROWN received on certificate from the Presbyterian congregation of Somerville, Ohio.

Hopewell, May 24, 1878 The following persons were received on examination: EDGAR W. BAKER, BELLE A. HAYS, MAG-GIE E. HAYS. Mr. Baker was admitted to the ordinance of baptism.

Whereas, the Committee appointed to confer with Wm. S. Ramsey reported that Mr. Ramsey stated that he had turned from the error of his ways and that he would endeavor to do right in the future, and desired to be restored to the privileges of the church and also asked for a certificate, therefore: Resolved, That Wm. S. Ramsey be and hereby is restored to the privileges of the church and also that his request for a certificate be granted. James A. Brown to attend Presbytery at Dayton on June 3, 1878. Resolved, That collections for the Boards of the church be taken monthly.

Certificates granted to MARY PAXTON & SINA L. PAXTON to connect with Unity congregation.

Hopewell, Aug. 16, 1878 William Caskey and Andrew Hamilton were appointed to confer with David P. Gray regarding his absenting himself from the ordinances of God's house, and if his reasons are Satisfactory to the Committee they are authorized to give him and his daughter a certificate of dismission from Hopewell congregation.

Received on certificate: MISS ANN HARBISON. On <u>Aug. 17</u> GERTRUDE SLICKER was received on examination. James A. Brown and A. B. Rock were appointed to divide the congregation into six districts. <u>Sept. 17, 1878</u> John Ramsey to attend Synod at Morning Sun, Ohio on the first Tues of Oct. 1878 at 2 o,clock p.m.

Hopewell, Oct. 15, 1878 The Committee appointed on David P. Gray's case reported. The Clerk reported in favor of granting Mr. Gray a certificate. Mr. Hamilton reported verbally stated that he was unwilling to grant Mr. Gray a certificate and gave his reasons why. Reports accepted and after some discussion, Mr. Gray's case was laid on the table for the present. A certificate was granted to IDA A. GRAY.

Oct. 20, 1878A certificate granted to MELVINA J. GIL-ESPIE McMILLAN.Nov. 30thA certificate grantedto MRS. MAGGIE McCREARY, formerly MAGGIE BROWN.Dec. 19thA certificate of dismission was granted toADDIE (ADA) E. MOREN.

Jan. 10, 1879 Received on examination: DAVID Hopewell, EDWARD PAXTON. Jan. 26th Certificates were granted to CHARLES H. HOCKERSMITH and RACHEL MARIA HOCKERSMITH, his wife, to connect with Unity congregation. Feb. 24th Certificates were granted to JAMES H. ALLEN and NANCY R. ALLEN, his wife, to connect with Fair Haven Certificates were granted to JAMES H. ALLEN Certificates were March 10th congregation. granted to NATHAN C. HARPER, SAMUEL R. BROWN and F. ELLEN BROWN. <u>Mar, 29th</u> A. B. Rock to attend Pres bytery at Morning Sun, Ohio, April 1, 1879. John Ramsey A. B. Rock to attend Presasked for a leave of absence which was granted. The Treasurer was instructed to send \$45 of the Sabbath School collections to the Board of Home Missions.

(A committee had long been struggling to complete a "report on Narrative and State of religion and also the congregational Statistics". No records can be found of this undertaking. It was completed on April 15, 1879.)

(The records are usually detailed as to who was late and who was absent. A typical meeting and the minutes follows:)

Hopewell, Friday, April 18, 1879 10 o.clock a.m. Same place (Hopewell Session house). Session convened and was opened with prayer by the Mod. (Rev. Campbell). Members present: Jas. A. Brown & Wm. Caskey. Shortly after Session was constituted, John Ramsey & Wm. Bell appeared and took their Seats. Absentees: And. Hamilton, Hugh Ramsey, A. B. Rock.

The following action was taken in Charles McDill case. Whereas Charles McDill has been quilty of the Sin of intoxication, and whereas he appeared before Session & expressed his Sorrow & repentance for his Sins. And also promised total abstinence from intoxicating liquors in the future. Therefore, Resolved, That he be and hereby is restored to the Sealing ordinances of God's house.

Jas. A. Brown was elected Treasurer of the Benevolent Contributions of the congregation for one year. Session took a recess till half past 10 o,clock tomorrow. Same place, <u>Apr. 19th</u>, 10 1/2 o,clock a.m. Session convened and was opened with prayer by the Mod. Members all present except And, Hamilton and A. B. Rock who Soon appeared.

On examination and profession of their faith in Christ, the following persons were received into membership of this congregation: ALEX. GILMORE McDILL, WALTER MCHATTON McDILL, SAMUEL McCRACKEN PAXTON, ANDREW REESE McCLENAHAN and SUSANNA RACHEL HARPER.

JOHN C. HAMILTON appeared before Session and Stated that he neglected to get his certificate from the Session of the United Presbyterian congregation of Indianapolis, and he further stated that he had for some time neglected his duty and promised to do better in the future. He was received into membership of this congregation. Adjourned with prayer. William Caskey, Clerk

At an informal meeting held <u>Dec. 7th</u> Mr. Andrew Brown requested certificates for himself and his family. James A. Brown and A. B. Rock were appointed a Committee to visit Mr. Brown and ascertain his reasons for asking for his and his family's certificates.

The Committee appointed to visit Mr. Brown reported that he stated that the reason that he and his family asked for their certificates was ill treatment received at the hands of A.P. Paxton.

Wm. Caskey and Hugh Ramsey to confer with A. P. Paxton and Andrew Brown and endeavor to reconcile them if possible.

Jan. 11, 1880 Wm. Caskey to attend Presbytery at Hamilton, Ohio, Jan. 12, 1880.

Hopewell, Jan. 17, 1880 The following persons were received on examination: ANDREW N. GRAHAM, NANCY G. PAXTON and HARRIET EVALINE McQUISTON. On certificate: WILLIAM A. DOUGLASS and MARY G. DOUGLASS, his wife.

The Pastor reported having examined Miss Ella Graham on the 20th day of Dec., 1879, and recommended her as a proper person to be received to baptism and the membership of this congregation. He also reported her death on the following day, Dec. 21st, 1879.

The committee appointed to confer with A. P. Paxton and

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Andrew Brown asked for further time for investigation which was granted. Mr. John Ramsey asked for and was granted a leave of absence.

Mr. James A. Brown was elected Treasurer of the benevolent contributions of the congregation for one year.

Hopewell, Mar. 16, 1880 James A. Brown, David B. Paxton and Wm. Caskey were appointed a Committee to prepare the report of the Sabbath School and report to the permanent committee on Sabbath Schools.

Wm. Caskey, Hugh Ramsey and James A. Brown were appointed to prepare the report on Narrative and State of religion.

Wm. Caskey, Wm. Bell, James A. Brown and Wm. McQuiston' were appointed a Committee to prepare the Statistical report of the congregation.

James A. Brown was reelected Superintendant of the Sabbath School for the ensuing year. John W. Graham was elected Secretary and Treasurer of the Sab. School for the ensuing year.

Robert S. Paxton, Calvin Brown and Albert Brown were appointed to lead the congregational Singing.

Resolved, That after the apportionment is filled the balance of the Sabbath School contributions be given to Home Missions.

Hopewell, Mar. 25, 1880 Report on Narrative and State of religion read and adopted. The Statistics were read and adopted. The report of the Sabbath School was adopted without reading.

Wm. Bell to attend Presbytery at Dayton, Ohio. <u>Apr. 20th</u> Wm. Bell's excuse for non attendance at Presbytery was sustained. The report of Sabbath School was reconsidered and the answer to the question, "What are your greatest hindrances?" stricken out.

A. B. Rock and Wm. Bell were appointed a Committee to visit Mr. Samuel Hockersmith and ascertain whether he followed the directions given in the Divine law, Matt. 18: 15-17", before handing in the paper containing the charges made against Mr. Andrew Hamilton (Elder) and if not why not and report at the next meeting of Session.

*Matthew 18: 15. Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. 16. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. 17. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican.

James A. Brown offered his resignation as Superintendant of the Sabbath School which was not accepted.

Hopewell, Apr. 23, 1880 The Committee appointed to visit Mr. Samuel Hockersmith reported that after calling his attention to the directions given in Matt 18: 15-17 they asked him if he had complied with these directions and he answered No. And when asked why he did not, he said he did not know that he was required to do so.

Whereas, the Committee had shown him his fault in this matter, therefore, Resolved, That no further action is necessary at present. James A. Brown to inform Mr. Hockersmith of the action of Session and give him the instruction that he needs to enable him to do his duty in this case.

<u>May 15th</u> MRS. MARIA F. GRAHAM was received into membership on examination. Mr. Hockersmith to be informed of the time of next meeting of Session. (Aug. 5, 2 P.M.)

Hopewell, Aug. 5, 1880 Members all present except Andrew Hamilton, Hugh Ramsey and A. B. Rock who appeared soon after Session was constituted.

A paper was presented by Mr. Samuel Hockersmith containing charges against Mr. Andrew Hamilton. See paper No. 1. After reading the paper and giving the parties an opportunity to settle the matter between themselves which proved a failure, Session accepted the paper and took steps to proceed to trial.

(No hint as to the nature of the disagreement is given in these Minutes of Session. Charges were made on separate papers, "See paper No. 1", which do not exist today.)

Hopewell, Aug. 18, 1880 The paper presented at the last meeting by Mr. Hockersmith containing charges against Andrew Hamilton, was taken up and read. See paper No. 1. To the 1st and 2nd charges, Mr. Hamilton plead limitation of time. Session decided in Mr. Hamilton's favor. The 3rd charge Mr. Hockersmith abandoned. The 4th and 5th charges Mr. Hockersmith produced no evidence to prove.

Mr. Hamilton produced no evidence. The parties were heard and removed. And after considering the case Session gave the following decision. Whereas Samuel Hockersmith failed to produce any evidence of the truth of the charges against Mr. Hamilton therefore, Resolved, That the case be and hereby is dismissed.

Immediately after adjournment Mr. Hamilton came in and upon hear the decision of Session asked for certificates for himself and family.

Hopewell.Sept. 11, 1880SAMUEL E. BROWN was receivedon examination.Wm. Caskey to attend Presbytery at Syca-more.Sept. 19thA. B. Rock to attend Synod.Sept. 28thDAVID B. PAXTON and MARTHA PAXTON, his wife,were granted certificates of dismission to Iowa.

Mr. Hamilton having asked for certificates for himself and his family, Session not being informed who were included in his family laid the request on the table till the next regular meeting with the exception of his own case.

Session took the follow action in Mr. Andrew Hamilton's case. Whereas, Mr. Andrew Hamilton, a member of this Session, has requested his certificate and Whereas, he has charged this Session with unfaithfulness in carrying out the discipline of the church. And also used language unbecoming a Christian gentleman, therefore, Resolved, That his request be not granted until he shows evidence of repentance and acknowledges his Sins, and also that the Clerk be instructed to send a copy of this paper to Mr. Hamilton by mail.

Hopewell, Nov. 16, 1880 Mr. Andrew Hamilton being present his case was taken up, and after considering it for some time the following action was taken. Whereas, Mr. Hamilton stated that it was his opinion that Session put a wrong construction on the language that he used at the former meeting and that he had no acknowledgements to make, therefore, Resolved, That his statement is not satisfactory.

Certificates were granted to JOHN C. HAMILTON, REBECCA A. HAMILTON and NANCY E. HAMILTON and also to JONATHAN ADKINS and MARY ANN ADKINS, his wife.

Hopewell, Dec. 10, 1880 MARTHA ANN RAMSEY was received into membership on examination. Miss Ramsey was not baptized and arrangements were made to administer the ordinance of baptism to her tomorrow which was attended to by the Mod.

JAMES McCLENAHAN presented himself as an applicant for membership. He stated that he had been a member of the Presbyterian church but through neglect of duty he lost his membership. But relying upon promised grace he said he resolved to forsake his Sins and live a Christian life. Therefore he was received into membership. Dec. 11, 1880 Wm. Caskey to attend Presbytery.

Dec. 17, 1880 GERTRUDE SLICKER was granted a certificate to connect with Oxford congregation.

Feb. 27, 1881 William Caskey to attend Presbytery at Oxford, Ohio, Tuesday, March 1st 1881.

(While it was required that each congregation's book of Minutes of Session be annually carried to Presbytery for inspection and approval, this book was inspected every two or three years. The next notation is: "Approved by order of Presbytery, March 1st 1881, Oxford, Ohio. Elihu C. Simpson, Clerk".)

Hopewell, Mar. 12, 1881 John W. Graham, Treasurer and Secretary of the Sabbath School offered his resignation, which was accepted. John C. F. Harper was elected Treasurer and Robert McQuiston was elected Secretary of the Sabbath School.

Mar. 21, 1881 Certificates were granted to THOMAS A. Mc-DILL and CAROLINE McDILL, his wife.

<u>May 17, 1881</u> It having appeared that Common Fame charges James McClenahan with unchristian conduct in two particulars, viz, The Sin of intoxication and profane swearing, therefore, Resolved, That James McClenahan be requested by the Moderator to appear at the next meeting of Session and answer to the above charges.

<u>June 18, 1881</u> The Moderator (Rev. Campbell) reported that he requested James McClenahan to appear before Session. But for certain reasons he declined coming today.

Hopewell, Aug. 16, 1881 The Session of Hopewell was appointed by Presbytery to prepare and present subjects for discussion at their next meeting. The Moderator submitted the following programme which was approved by Session.

1st The propriety, advantage of, and how to conduct testimoney meetings. Mal. 3:16, Ps. 66:16. (Malachi, 3:16. Then they that feared the LORD spake often one to another: and the LORD hearkened and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the LORD, and that thought upon his name.) (Psalms, 66: 16. Come and hear, all ye that fear God, and I will declare what he hath done for my soul.)

2nd Praise Meetings--Is(aiah), 12:4 and Ps(alms), 67.

3rd Inquiry Meetings--Acts 2:37 and John 3:2,3.

4th What is the duty of Session to those who engage in social dancing.

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Dr. Harris and James I. Faris appeared as a Committee from the Session of Morning Sun, requesting the following item to be inserted in the programme prepared by this Session for discussion at the next meeting of Presbytery.

What is the duty of Session to those who justify social dancing?

A. B. Rock was appointed a delegate to the next meeting of Presbytery at Hopewell.

Hopewell, Aug. 24, 1881 CHARLES R. McDILL, ANNIE E. McDILL, his wife, and A. B. ROCK (Elder) and MARTHA F. ROCK, his wife, requested their certificates. Their request was granted and the Clerk was instructed to furnish them as soon as convenient.

The request for certificates for ANDREW BROWN and ELIZA BROWN, his wife, JOHN C. BROWN and EMMA BROWN, his wife, and WILLIAM T. BROWN and IDA BROWN, his wife, was taken up. (Andrew Brown being present by request of Session).

And whereas, we have learned that they have been received into Unity congregation on certificate if they can get them, or on examination if they fail to procure certificates, and whereas, a person cannot be a member of two congregations at the same time, therefore, Resolved

1st That the request be laid on the table until we receive further information concerning the action of the Session of Unity in this matter.

2nd That the Clerk of this Session be directed to ask the Session of Unity for a certified copy of the action taken in the case of Andrew Brown and his wife, John C. Brown and his wife and also William T. Brown and his wife, at their meeting on the 19th day of Aug. 1881.

<u>Hopewell, Sept. 13, 1881</u> At an informal meeting of Session, a Committee was appointed to prepare a paper containing the statements of the parties named in the minutes of last meeting.

The Committee presented their report this morning which was adopted and the Clerk was instructed to present the report accompanied by a copy of the action of Unity Session taken in this case to the 1st Presbytery of Ohio today. The Clerk presented the paper as directed by Session.

The two following questions were asked in the paper presented to Presbytery: 1st Under the jurisdiction of which Session are the above named parties? Presbytery answered: Hopewell Session. 2nd What is the courtesy and morality that should exist between the Sessions of neighboring congregations? Presbytery's answer: The Golden Rule.

Hopewell, Oct. 8, 1881 Robert S. Paxton tendered his resignation of the positions he held as leader of the choir and Teacher in the Sabbath School. His resignation was accepted.

Whereas, James McClenahan was guilty of the Sin of intoxication about the 1st of last May, and whereas he has been guilty of the Same Sin several times since last May and pleads guilty to the charges. But after refusing to appear before Session and shows no evidence of true repentance and reformation, therefore,

Resolved, That he be and hereby is suspended from the sealing ordinances of God's house until he gives evidence of true repentance and reformation.

William Bell was appointed a delegate to Synod at Springfield, Ohio, and also to the Sabbath School convention which will meet before the Synod meets.

Session took a recess till after Sermon. After Sermon, Session convened and MRS. MARTHA F. STEEL was on examination and profession of her faith in Christ received into membership of this congregation. And the ordinance of baptism was administered to her Sabbath morning before Sermon. Session took a recess till after Communion Services. After Communion Services, Session adjourned with prayer.

<u>Hopewell, Oct. 25, 1881</u> On motion the request of Andrew Brown for certificates was taken up and the clerk was instructed to give the following certificates to those who are included in the request.

That ANDREW BROWN and ELIZA BROWN, his wife, JOHN C. BROWN and EMMA BROWN, his wife, and WILLIAM T. BROWN and IDA M. BROWN, his wife, and ALBERT S. BROWN are members in the United Presbyterian congregation of Hopewell, in the county of Preble, State of Ohio, and are hereby dismissed at their own request, is attested this 25th day of Oct., 1881.

<u>Dec. 25, 1881</u> William Caskey to attend Presbytery at Unity, Ind. on Tues., Dec. 27, 1881. (Unity U.P. Church was located in the Indiana side of College Corner which is bisected by the Ohio-Indiana State Line.)

<u>Hopewell, Jan. 18, 1882</u> Session met at the Session house. Members present: Hugh Ramsey, James A. Brown and Wm. Caskey. John Ramsey soon appeared.

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On examination and profession MICHAEL YEAKLE and NANCY E. YEAKLE, his wife, were received into membership.

Jan. 21, 1882 The following persons were received on examination: MARY MINA PAXTON, SINA McCANDLESS PAXTON and CORA PAXTON.

Jan. 22, 1882 Rev. John Williamson assisted with the Communion Services.

Apr. 10, 1882. Hugh Ramsey to attend Presbytery at Morning Sun on Apr. 11, 1882 at 2 o, clock p.m.

<u>Apr. 30, 1882</u> The Clerk was instructed to send a written notice to Mr. Andrew Hamilton requesting him to meet with the Session on May 16th for the purpose of settling the difficulty between Session and himself.

Hopewell, May 16, 1882 The Clerk of Presbytery furnished the Session with a copy of the Action of the 1st Presbytery of Ohio in Mr. Hamilton's case.

Mr. Hamilton failed to meet with the Session according to a notice sent to him. Whereupon the Session took the following action.

Whereas, the 1st Presbytery of Ohio at its meeting held at Morning Sun, Ohio, on April 11th, 1882, advised the Session of Hopewell to give Mr. Andrew Hamilton "a certificate of dismission at its earliest convenience". Presbytery stated in its paper that the difficulty between Mr. Hamilton and the Session "seems to be a missunderstanding as to the meaning of some expressions made use of by Mr. Hamilton in the presence of said Session". And Presbytery further stated in its paper, "that it would be in the interest of peace and prevent further agitation, and also that Mr. Hamilton expressed a sincere regret to its committee that language susceptable of such construction should have been made use of by him, and whereas we believe the difficulty is not in the meaning but in the application which Mr. Hamilton made of the language that he used in the presence of the Session, and whereas we are not aware that the withholding of Mr. Hamilton's certificate is disturbing the peace or likely to produce any more agitation than any other similar case and whereas, we believe Mr. Hamilton is guilty of the charges preferred against him by this Session, and that it would be fostering a spirit of disobedience to give Mr. Hamilton without making a confession to this Session, and whereas the word of God forbids us to do evil that good may come and we prefer to obey God rather than men, therefore, (It is uncertain when the end of the quote from the Presbytery report appears.

Resolved 1st That we respectfully decline following the advice of the 1st Presbytery of Ohio.

Resolved 2nd That whenever Mr. Hamilton makes a satisfactory confession to this Session we will willingly give him a certificate.

Resolved 3rd That the Clerk be directed to furnish the 1st Presbytery of Ohio with a copy of the proceedings in the case of Mr. Hamilton. Wm. Caskey to attend next meeting of Presbytery.

Hopewell, June 9, 1882 James A. Brown was reelected Superintendant of Sabbath School without limitation of time.

Robert McQuiston was reelected Secretary and Treasurer of the Sabbath School.

On examination MARY E. RAMSEY and LYDIA MARTHA HAYS were received into membership.

June 10, 1882 IDA MAY YEAKLE and WILLIAM YEAKLE were received on examination; EDWARD PAXTON on certificate.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That we respectfully ask the 1st Presbytery of Ohio to instruct Mr. Andrew Hamilton to submit to the authority of Hopewell Session.

June 18, 1882 Wm. Caskey, James A. Brown and Hugh Ramsey to meet with the Committee appointed by the 1st Presbytery at Oxford on the 22nd of June 1882 for the purpose of settling the difficulty between Mr. Hamilton & Session.

<u>Hopewell. Sept. 19, 1882</u> Committee report is as follows: Your Committee respectfully report that it met with the Committee appointed by the 1st Presbytery of Ohio on the 22nd of June 1882 and accepted the following confession as a final settlement of the difficulty between Mr. Hamilton and the Session of Hopewell congregation.

Mr. Hamilton's paper: I hereby sincerely regret that I used language offensive to the Session of Hopewell at any of its meetings. And this I do to meet the resolution adopted by the said Session at its meeting Sept. 28, 1880 in which it refused me a certificate of Standing and dismission. This acknowledgement to be accepted by the Session in lieu of that requirement in said resolution. Oxford, June 22, 1882 (signed) Andrew Hamilton

On the 22nd day of June, Mr. ANDREW HAMILTON was granted and received a certificate of standing and dismissal to connect with Fair Haven congregation.

On the 3rd of Sept. certificates were granted to EDWARD PAXTON and MRS. FANNIE WILSON. ALEXANDER G. McDILL was granted a certificate to connect with the congregation of Springfield, Ohio.

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Session met; Rev. J. C. Campbell, Moderator. Oct. 27, 1882 Members all present. On examination EMMA BROWN and ELLIE BROWN were received as members. MARY ALICE SHEPHERD was granted a certificate of standing and dismissal. Session took a recess until one and a half o, clock [sic] tomorrow. Oct. 28th MARGARET ELIZABETH BELL was received on examination. Rev. D. M. Ure assisted with communion services on Oct. 29th.

Hopewell, Session met at the session Nov. 21, 1882 house. Resolved, That Session request the Moderator to see Mrs. Martha Steel and ascertain the reasons why she and her husband were living apart. Hugh Ramsey to see Mr. Joseph C. Steel and ascertain the reasons why he and his wife were living apart.

Resolved, That the funds be raised this year by subscription for the following Boards of the Church: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Freedmens Mission and Church Estension. Each Elder to attend to his own district.

Jan. 20, 1883 No business. Rev. J. Y. Scouller, D.D. assisted with Communion services on Sabbath, Jan. 21st. A certificate of dismission given to ROBERT Jan. 29th MCOUISTON to connect with Morning Sun Church. Feb. 20th Hugh Ramsey reported that he saw Mr. J. C. Steel and that Mr. Steel stated that his wife left him without any reasons known to him and that she refused to return and live with him. Resolved, That the case be laid on the table for the present.

That William P. McQuiston be appointed to take Resolved, charge of the choir and use his influence to improve the Singing and reorganize the choir. The following persons were appointed Sabbath School teachers: W. J. Paxton, Maggie Campbell and Nannie Bell. Mar. 20th W. J. Paxton accepted the appointment to teach Sabbath School. The others declined to accept.

Hopewell, April 17, 1883 A conference was held on the propriety of the contemplated Three Quarter Centenial [sic] of Hopewell Congregation and the names of several ministers suggested as suitable persons to take part in the exercises on the occasion. June 16th Members all present except the Clerk who soon appeared. On examination EVA JANE STEEL was received on examination. June 19, 1883 Mr. Samuel Graham to teach class No. 4 in Sabbath School.

Nov. 17, 1883 Session met and was constituted with prayer by Rev. J. C. Campbell, Moderator. Members present: James A. Brown, William Bell and William Caskey. On examination the following were received into membership: CARRIE FLORENCE MCQUISTON, EVA CAROLINE MCQUISTON, MINA ARABEL HARPER,

JOHN WILLIAM BROWN and JAMES WARREN SMITH. MRS. SARAH PAXTON was received on certificate from Unity (College Corner) congregation. William Caskey, Clerk

Hopewell, Nov. 24, 1883 Members all present, Elder Hugh Ramsey appointed to preside. At an informal meeting held Nov. 21st, Wm. Caskey and Wm. Bell were appointed a committee to visit Mr. (Rev.) J. C. Campbell and confer with him in regard to certain reports in circulation injurious to his Christian character. Said committee was also instructed to confer with various parties and learn the nature of the reports in circulation touching Mr. Campbell's reputation and report at the next meeting of Session.

The committee appointed respectfully report that we visited the parties as directed and learned of the nature of the reports touching Mr. Campbell's reputation and that we also visited Mr. Campbell and stated to him the reports in circulation touching his ministerial reputation. And after holding a lengthy conference, Mr. Campbell stated to your committee that his usefulness was done here and that he would offer his resignation at the first meeting of Presbytery and demand an investigation.

Report accepted and further action by session considered unnecessary. On Sabbath morning, <u>Nov. 25th</u>, Mr. Campbell sent by Dr. Paxton the following notice, "I expect to be released from the responsibility of Hopewell Pastorate at the first meeting of our Presbytery. (Signed) J. C. Campbell." Mr. Campbell was released by Presbytery Dec. 26, 1883.

Hopewell, Dec. 29, 1883 After holding a lengthy conference on what is the best thing to do in our present distracted condition, session concluded to go on in the path of duty, seeking devine guidance as we go forward. Rev. Samuel A. Buck invited to preach on the 1st and 2nd Sabbaths of Jan.

Jan. 6, 1884 SARAH DALES CAMPBELL was granted a certificate of dismission. James A. Brown to attend Presbytery at Richmond, Indiana. <u>Feb. 19th</u> NANNIE C. BELL was granted a certificate to connect with the United Presbyterian congregation of Bloomington, Indiana.

<u>Apr. 12, 1884</u> On examination of following persons were received into membership: SARAH ANNA MCQUISTON, MARY SALINA PAXTON, MRS. LAURA HARPER and MARY E. HAYS. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper tomorrow, April 13th, at Hopewell by Rev. W. F. Maclaughlan. <u>June 21st</u> Session appointed a congregational meeting on June 24th to consider the propriety of making out a call for a Pastor. <u>Aug. 2nd</u> Rev. E. H. Huston, Moderator pro. tem. IDA ISABEL DOUGLASS and ROSA BROWN received as members on examination. William Caskey, Clerk <u>Sept. 20, 1884</u> The Clerk presented a written request from MRS. ELIZA J. CAMPBELL asking Session to grant her and her daughter, MAGGIE, their certificates of dismissal. After some discussion the request was laid on the table for the present. <u>Sept. 27th</u> The request of MRS. ELIZA J. CAMPBELL was taken up and after some discussion, Session agreed to grant two certificates "up to the time when they ceased worshiping at Hopewell". Record of the votes: Yeas, Hugh Ramsey, Wm. Bell and Wm. Caskey; Nays, James A. Brown; excused from voting, John Ramsey.

REV. E. H. HUSTON commenced his ministerial labors at Hopewell congregation on the 1st Sabbath of Oct., 1884 and was installed Oct. 28th, 1884. Hugh Ramsey to attend Synod at Indianapolis on the 21st of Oct., 1884, at 7:30 p.m.

Hopewell, Oct. 18, 1884 Certificates of dismissal to R. S. PAXTON and MARY G., his wife. Feb. 7, 1885 MRS. MAGGIE HUSTON received on certificate. Resolved, That the collection for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Board of Church Extension and Freedmens Missions to be taken by subscription, each Elder to canvas his own quarter.

May 16, 1885 MISS SARAH JANE HARPER was received on examination. Certificates of dismissal were granted to ARTHUR A. GRAHAM and MARY F., his wife, to connect with the Presby. Church at Liberty, Ind. Mr. James A. Brown, Supt. of Sabbath School, reported that he had supplied too vacant classes with teachers, Mrs. Maggie Huston and Miss Mattie Bell.

<u>Aug. 31, 1885</u> JAMES WARREN SMITH dismissed on certificate to connect with Fair Haven congregation. A committee appointed to draft a series of resolutions in reference to the death of Father (John) Ramsey. Elder James A. Brown resigned as Supt. of Sabbath School for health reasons; Miss Mina Harper was appointed Secretary of the Sab. School.

Hopewell, Sept. 26, 1885 Steel, which has been lying on the table for some time, was taken up. Resolved, That there is no grounds for process against Mr. Steel. A certificate of dismission granted MRS. BELL FISHER, formerly Hays, to connect with Fair Haven U.P. congregation. William Caskey, Clerk

Oct. 5, 1885 MRS. MARTHA ANN BROWN given a certificate of dismissal to connect with Unity Cong., Ind. (NOTE: The Ohio-Indiana state line runs through the center of College Corner. The church was then in Indiana; the church built later is in Ohio.)

Nov. 11, 1885 MISS DELLIE PAXTON resigned as Sabbath School teacher. The series of resolutions respecting the death of Father Ramsey were adopted: Whereas, It has pleased God in his providence, to call to his heavenly home our aged father, John Ramsey, who for about forty five years was a member of this Session.

Resolved 1, That recognizing the right of our Heavenly Father to do as he will with his own, we bow Submissively to his will.

2 That we bear testimony to the Christian faithfulness, zeal and godly example of Father Ramsey, who was a living epistle known and read of all with whom he came in contact.

3. That by this providence, we, as members of Session, are admonished to be more dilligent and faithful in the service of our Master, knowing that our time on earth is Short.

4. That we tender our sympthy [sic] to the bereaved family and commend them to that One, who has Said "I will be a Father unto you and ye shall be my sons and daughters".

5. That a copy be sent to the United Presbyterian (magazine) for publication and also a copy be sent to the bereaved family. Rev. E. H. Huston, Mod. William Caskey, Clerk

Nov. 22, 1885 Cert. of dismissal granted MISS SUSIE R. HARPER to connect with Presby. church, Derby, Kansas. Mrs. Ella Harper to take Dellie (Della) Paxton's class. Elder James A. Brown was elected Treasurer of Sabbath School Funds. Dec. 9th Certs. of dismissal granted to MR. NATHAN L. RAMSEY and wife, MARY E., to connect with Morning Sun congregation.

Hopewell, Feb. 13, 1886 Certificates of dismissal granted to JAMES G. HARPER and LAURA, his wife, and also to SARAH J. and MINA A. HARPER. The following were received on examination: WILLIAM L. RAMSEY, WILLIAM E. SCROGG, JAMES EMRY PAXTON, ELLIE E. DOUGLASS and ANNIE OLLIE BROWN. Wm. Caskey to confer with Walter McDill in regard to floating rumors injurious to his Christian character, Sept. 4th Resolved, That the Sabbath School close for the winter on the last Sabbath of Oct. 17th James A. Brown to attend Synod at Spring Hill, Oct. Indiana on Oct. 19th at 2 o, clock [sic] p.m. Dec. 26th ROBERT MILLER and his wife, MARGARET ANN MILLER, received on certificate from Presby. church, Eaton, Ohio.

Feb. 4, 1887 WILLIAM R. REED and his wife, MAGGIE, received on cert. from Reformed Presby. cong. of Idaville, Ind. MILTON BROWN received on examination and baptism. Feb. 6th MAGGIE M. McQUISTON received on exam. Mar. 16th Session resolved to reopen the Sab. School on the first Sab. in April.

May 18, 1887 MR. JAMES G. HARPER, MRS. LAURA HARPER and MINA HARPER were received on cert. from Kansas. Oct. 8, 1887

Oct. 8, 1887 Cert. of dismissal to MRS. MARY J. HARRIS, formerly Bell, to connect with the U.P. Church at Pioneer City, Neb. Oct. 30, 1887 Cert. of dismissal granted to MICHAEL YEAKLE, wife, NANCY, and son, WILLIAM, and daughther, IDA MAY.

Hopewell, Jan. 20, 1888 MISS NARCISSA HOCKERSMITH and CORX T. MCQUISTON were admitted on examination. MRS. SUSAN RAMSEY and MISS MARY ANN RAMSEY were admitted on exam. and baptism. <u>May 19th</u> MR. SAMUEL E. BROWN granted cert. of dismissal. Mr. Samuel Paxton appointed Sec. of Sab. School. <u>Sept. 22nd</u> Committee to confer with Joseph C. Steel with reference to his neglecting public ordinances.

Hopewell, Jan. 29, 1889 REV. E. H. HUSTON was released from the pastoral charge of Hopewell congregation by the First Presbytery of Ohio. <u>Apr. 6th</u> Report on conversation with Joseph C. Steel unsatisfactory. Committee to confer with Wm. A. Douglass in reference to reports injurious to his Christian character. James A. Brown, Supt. of Sab. School; S. M. Paxton, Secretary; same teachers as last year except two who resigned and John Paxton and Miss Cora Paxton to take their places. Mrs. Irene McQuiston was appointed teacher of the Infant class.

<u>June 6, 1889</u> Joseph C. Steel stated to committee that he would rather attend church at Morning Sun because it is more convenient for him to do so and his girls would rather go there. Certs. of dismissal issued to J. C. STEEL and EVA J. STEEL, daughter. <u>June 19th</u> William A. Douglass appeared before the Session, acknowledged his faults and promised by the grace of God to endeavor to do better in the future. <u>Sept. 9th</u> Cert. of dismissal granted to MRS. MAGGIE HUSTON to connect with Utica, Ohio congregation.

Nov. 30, 1889 Rev. J. T. Wilson, Moderator pro. tem. Certs. of dismissal granted to JAMES G. HARPER, wife LAURA and daughter MINA to connect with Richmond, Ind. congregation. Admitted on examination MARY E. DOUGLASS and ELSIE J. CASKEY. William Caskey, Clerk

Hopewell, Feb. 17, 1890 of dismissal. Apr. 20th REV. J. F. HUTCHISON, D.D., Moderator. MISS MARY ANN WILSON received on examination. Certs. of dismissal granted to JAMES A. SAMUEL HOCKERSMITH and his wife, MARTHA, were granted certificates of standing and dismissal.

<u>May 16, 1891</u> Certificates of dismissal were granted to J. W. PAXTON and wife to connect with Presby. Church in Liberty, Indiana. <u>Aug. 15th</u> Mistress Minnie Mosa, who by conduct some time ago, deprived herself of the privileges of the Church, volentarily appeared before Session and expressed her sorrow for her sins and promised to endeavor to live a Christian life in the future and asked to be restored to the privileges of the Church. After considering her case, Session unanimously agreed to restore her privileges. <u>Dec. 12th</u> MRS. M. J. McDILL granted a cert. of dismissal. William Caskey, Clerk

Hopewell, Apr. 10, 1892 Presbytery at Dayton, Ohio. was received on examination. Elder Hugh Ramsey to attend Sept. 4th JOSEPH RAMSEY William Caskey, Clerk

Hopewell, Feb. 25, 1893 MARION MCQUISTON was received MRS. NARCISSA N. WRIGHT, formerly on examination. May 4th Hockersmith, was dismissed by cert. to Morning Sun, Ohio. June 8th MILTON BROWN and wife, MARGARET JESSIE, were dismissed by certificate. June 18th SAMUEL M. PAXTON and wife, MAGGIE, granted certificated to unite with Unity congregation, College Corner, Ind. MISS MAGGIE M. WILSON and MISS EMMA WILSON were received on examination and were baptized. A cert. of Standing and dismissal was July 1st granted MRS. MINNIE MOSA. Sept. 30th Mr. Benjamin Elliott came to us certified as a ruling Elder and was elected to the office of Ruling Elder in this congregation today. Dec. 24th Session met to give WILLIAM A. DOUGLASS a cert. of dismissal.

Hopewell, Feb. 24, 1894 The following persons were received on examination: WALTER R. DOUGLASS, DAVID CLYDE McQUISTON, ANNA A. CASKEY and MARY I. BLANCHE PAXTON. July 22nd SAMUEL GRAHAM received on exam. Jan. 12, 1895 JOHN R. FOSTER received on exam. A certificate of dismissal was granted to MRS. EMMA L. RAMSEY HEITSMAN to connect with Fair Haven United Presby. congregation. Jan. 13, 1895 A certificate of dismission was given by the Clerk to WILLIAM L. RAMSEY to connect with the Fair Haven Congregation. William Caskey, Clerk Nov. 25, 1895 The Clerk gave ELDER HUGH RAMSEY and his son, JOSEPH RAMSEY and daughter, MAGGIE J. RAMSEY, and granddaughter, ANNA RAMSEY, certificates of dismission to connect with Fair Haven congregation. (This was the last entry by William Caskey, who had been Clerk of Session since 1872.)

April, 1896 REV. S. H. McDILL began labors Hopewell, as stated supply in this congregation on the 3rd Sabbath of April, 1896. (He also became the Clerk.) June 11th Rev. E. B. Stewart of San Francisco, Cal. assisted with Communion services today. Aug. 12th Election of new elders: Mr. Charles Harper, 18 votes; Mr. John Graham, 18 votes; Mr. James Emry Paxton, 16 votes; Mr. Wm. Scruggs, 13 votes. Certificate granted to MISS ELSIE CASKEY. Oct. 12th Oct. 30th MRS. SARAH McDILL was received on certificate. (Mrs. Sarah [Shannon] McDill was the wife of Rev. Samuel Hampton McDill.) Since last Communion, ELMER ROSS HARPER and MARTHA PAXTON were baptized. Nov. 10th Rev. S. H. MCDILL was installed as pastor.

<u>Hopewell, Jan. 24, 1897</u> MR. JOHN PAXTON received by examination. <u>June 10th</u> Those who were elected elders some months ago, not having accepted, another election was held today resulting in the election of John Graham, 16 votes; Mr. Charles Harper, 12 votes; and Mr. Emry Paxton, 12 votes. <u>Aug. 1st</u> Mr. Charles Harper and Mr. J. Emry Paxton were ordained and installed as elders. Mr. Paxton was chosen Clerk. <u>Oct. 19th</u> It was moved and seconded that we (the Session) meet every three months. <u>Oct. 23rd</u> EDNA MAY McDILL was baptized. Rev. Samuel McDill was assisted by his father, Rev. Nathan C. McDill, during the Communion services.

Dec. 13, 1897 The following officers were elected to Sabbath School: Supt.-J. M. Paxton, Ass't. Supt.-Mammie Douglass, Sec.-Emma Wilson, Asst. Sec. Clayton McQuiston, Treas.-Rosa Brown. J. M. Paxton refused to act and Miss Maggie McQuiston was elected in his stead. Each class was given the right of choice as to teachers. J. M. Paxton elected Singing Clerk; J. Emry Paxton and Cora McQuiston, assistants.

Jan. 23, 1898 Certificate of dismissal granted Hopewell, to DELCENA J. PAXTON, NANNIE G. and MARY S. PAXTON to connect with Unity Church at College Corner. July 24th MISS MATTIE IRENE McQUISTON received into membership on examination. Certificate granted to JONATHAN PAXTON to College Corner, Ohio. July 24th MRS. ELSIE CASKEY TUTTLEY was received by certificate. The following members were received on examination: MR. SAMUEL G. TUTTLEY, MISS LUCY AGNES WILSON. Miss Wilson was Dec. 6th The following officers were elected baptized. for Sabbath School: Supt .- Anna McQuiston, Assistant Supt. -

Cora McQuiston, Sec.- Ida Douglass, Asst. sec.- Mina Paxto Treas.-Lizzie Bell (refined; Cora Paxton ele ed), J. M. 1 ton, Cora McQuiston and Mag 2 McQuiston, leaders of the singin

Hopewell, Apr. 3, 1893 Admitted on certificate: MISS FLORENCE SCROGGS, JOHN H. SCROGGS, EARL SCROGGS and ARTHUR SCROGGS. May 7th Received on examination, CARL DOUGLASS and FRED GRAHAM and by certificate, MRS. ETHEL BUCK from College Corner. Oct. 8th Rev. Warnock assisted at Communion services. J. E. Paxton, Clerk

Hopewell, 1900 Session met June 8 & 10 and Oct. 3 & 5; meetings were promptly adjourned.

Hopewell, Jan. 11, 1901 MRS. CAROLINE FESSENDEN was received by certificate and her daughter, MARTHA JEANNETTE FESSENDEN, by profession of her faith (examination). Jan. 12th ELSIE McDILL received by profession of faith.

Hopewell, Jan. 12, 1902 THOMAS MARION BUCK was received into the church on profession. <u>Mar. 30th</u> MRS. CLARA EWING McQUISTON was received by certificate from Fairhaven. <u>May 24th</u> MRS. SARAH M. PAXTON was received by certificate from M. E. Church of College Corner. <u>Oct. 25th</u> ANNA ISABEL GRAHAM and JESSIE AGNES PAXTON were received on profession. ("Profession" now used instead of "examination")

Hopewell, Jan. 10, 1903 CHARLES H. BUCK received on profession. Jan. 18th MARION N. PAXTON received on profession.

Hopewell, June 11, 1904 on profession of faith. Aug. 7th Certificates issued to MRS. SARAH H. McDILL and daughter, ELSIE, when called for. (Rev. S. H. McDill was still the Moderator of Session but clearly intended to leave.)

<u>Hopewell, Mar. 18, 1905</u> (REV. WM. EDWARD PAXTON appeared as Moderator without previous notice.) The following persons were received as members by profession of their faith in Christ: MISS EUNICE H. PAXTON and MISS MARY E. GRAHAM. Charles Harper was the nominee for delegate to Assembly in Washington, Iowa.

June 16, 1905 J. W. Graham, 26 votes, and Samuel G. Tuttley, 29 votes, were elected to the office of Ruling Elders. Mr. Graham did not accept. <u>Sept. 10th</u> Ordination services for Samuel G. Tuttley as Ruling Elder in Hopewell Session. <u>Nov. 26th</u> MRS. MARGARET BUCK, MISS ANNA BUCK AND MISS LOTTIE BUCK were received into membership on certificates from the

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College Corner U. P. congregation. Elder J. CHARLES HARPER, MRS. ELLA HARPER, his wife, and his sons, FRANK and HARRY, were granted certificates when called for to connect with the Santa Ana, California, congregation.

Hopewell, Mar. 18, 1906 MISS NETTIE FESSENDEN was granted a certificate to connect with the Presby. Church, Camden, Ohio. Sept. 2nd Certificate to MISS EUNICE PAXTON who has removed. Elder William Bell had died since the last meeting.

Hopewell, Mar. 22, 1907 Mr. Reese McClanahan and Mr. Clyde McQuiston were elected new elders but both said that they could not see their way clear to accept at this time. <u>Mar. 24th</u> MR. LAWRENCE E. PAXTON AND MRS. LUCY POSTON were admitted on profession of faith. <u>Oct. 1907</u> Clayton McQuiston and John M. Paxton were elected as new elders.

Hopewell, Apr. 3, 1908 MRS. SARAH J. WILSON was admitted to membership on profession. The following were received on certificate from the M. E. Church, Radnor, Ind.: MR. JOHN McCOUCH, MRS. IDA McCOUCH and JAMES McCOUCH. ROBERT GORDON and ANNA RUTH, children of John M. and Millie Paxton (were baptized.)

<u>Apr. 5, 1908</u> MRS. BLANCHE WITTER, formerly Paxton, was certified to College Corner. HERBERT MINOR BUCK was received as a member on profession. <u>Aug. 30th</u> MRS. MARY NORWOOD PAXTON was received on certificate from the Presby. church. <u>Dec. 20th</u> MR. JOHN BELL on renewal of his profession and and MRS. FANNIE BELL, his wife, on profession, were received as members.

Hopewell, Mar. 27, 1909 MR. WILLIAM POSTON was received as a member on profession and baptism. Certificate of dismissal was issued to MR. JOHN GRAHAM and wife, SINA, and children, FRED, ISABEL and MARY, to Fort Morgan, Colo. U. P. Church and MRS. MARY HAYS to Fairhaven and MISS CORA PAXTON to College Corner.

Hopewell, March, 1910 Session having failed to secure an elder at the last election and Elder Benjamin Elliott having died, it was decided to ask again for 2 additional elders. Mr. John M. Paxton and Mr. D. Clyde McQuiston were elected. May 8th Mr. John Paxton did not accept. Mr. Clyde McQuiston presented himself for ordination. After answering the formula of questions prescribed, he was ordained by prayer and laying on of the hands of session and was installed an elder in the Hopewell congregation. Hopewell, Feb. 4, 1911 The following were received on profession of their faith: MISS EDNA LOUISA TUTTLEY and MR. DWIGHT CASKEY TUTTLEY and their names were added to our roll. The following were certified to College Corner congregation: MRS. ETHEL BUCK, MR. MARION BUCK, MR. CHARLES BUCK, MR. HERBERT BUCK and MRS. MARTHA ELLIOTT. <u>Dec. 17th</u> Certificates to MR. LOTUS PAXTON and to MR. MARION PAXTON.

Hopewell, Apr. 7, 1912 The pastor conducted preparatory services (for Communion) on Fri. and Sat. at 2 PM. Before the Sermon and Communion, the child of Wm. Poston was baptized. S. G. Tuttley to attend Presbytery at Cincinnati.


Oct., 1913 Session met and adjourned after Communion.

Hopewell, Oct. 11, 1914 MISS CORA and MISS MATTIE McQUISTON were granted certificates to Morning Sun Church. MR. ROBERT and MISS MARTHA McQUISTON and MISS LORETTA and MISS MARGARET POSTON were admitted on profession. <u>Nov. 29th</u> MR. SATER FARR and MRS. PEARL FARR, his wife, having been members of the M. E. Church but not having their letters of dismissal from the church from which they had removed into our bounds yet have regularly attended our church for several years, met with Session and requested to be taken into this Congregation. They were received and their daughter, RUTH, on profession of her faith and baptism, added to our roll.

Hopewell, June 7, 1915 Prior to meeting, certificates had been issued to MR. JOHN McCOUCH and MISS MARTHA RAMSEY to united with College Corner congregation. Certificates were also granted to MRS. SARAH J. WILSON to unite with Fair Haven and to MR. ROMA PAXTON to unite with Morning Sun congregations. <u>Aug. 2nd</u> A meeting of the congregation was called for Sept. 9, 1915 at 1:30 Sun time.

<u>Nov. 11, 1915</u> Session met and was constituted with prayer by Rev. W. E. Paxton. By motion the new communion set to be returned to the (blank) Miss Margaret McQuiston and the old communion sets to be preserved with the church, the linens to be divided among the present members of the congregation and that the books be left in the pews. Rev. W. E. Paxton was asked to take charge of the different records and books of Hopewell congregation and with this request he complied.

<u>March 16, 1916</u> Session met at the home of Samuel Tuttley. The business brought before the meeting was to endorse the certificates granted by the Commission of the First Presbytery of Ohio. The certificates were found to be correct and they were mailed to the different members. Session adjourned with prayer.

HOPEWELL CHURCH CONGREGATION TREASURERS' REPORTS

PREFACE

While the Treasurers' Reports book for Hopewell Church runs from 1850-1912, only the 1850-1861 records are now included. The remaining years will be finished after other Hopewell records with higher historic priorities have been completed.

These 1850-1861 Treasurers' Reports are included only to give a three-sided view of the Hopewell Congregation for this period in time: The Congregational Meetings, the Session Records and the Treasurers' Reports.

This has been a very frustrating recording because most of the Treasurers, generally, could not tell a Debit from a Credit. These records have been corrected for accuracy.

John Wallace was a splendid Treasurer during his tenure. When he took over the accounts in 1859, the previous year's operating expenses had been \$37.13. In 1859 they were \$584.92. Apparently he left in mid-year 1861 for the Civil War in which he was a Lt. Col. He died in April, 1866, age 37, and is buried in Hopewell Cemetery.

REV. ALEXANDER PORTER'S VISITITATION NOTES OF FAMILIES AND NEW COMMICANTS RECORDS -1819-1833 -- INDEX OF HOPEWELL FAMILIES - INDEX OF NEW COMMUNICANTS This notebook is no new "Historic Find". It had been passed down through his descending families as a curious memento of Rev. Alexander Porter, first permanent minister of Hopewell Church (1814-1833).

The notebook was written in a very obscure form of shorthand and for over 130 years it was interesting but meaningless.

The late Homer Hays Irwin undertook the thankless task of finding out if it could be transcribed. The following pages will show that there was also a considerable amount of translation involved.

Research has disclosed that there were hundreds of forms of shorthand at that time. An 1850 book on the subject reported shorthand dating back into the 18th century and that in the early 1800's, almost every journalist had his own form of shorthand.

I wrote to Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., from which Rev. Porter was reported to have graduated, to learn if it was a subject taught at that college.

Martha C. Slotten, Archivist and Curator of Special Collections for Dickinson College, noted that while Alexander Porter had not graduated from Dickinson, he had studied Theology with Charles Nisbet, their first president.

Clearly Ms. Slotten had many inquiries and had acquired a sizeable dozier on Rev. Porter and Hopewell Church, including a photocopy of a letter to a friend from Carlisle in 1790--"nothing much of substance in it".

Where Rev. Porter learned his brand of shorthand will probably always be a mystery. But we are blessed to have his transcribed and translated records.

LISTING OF FAMILIES AND NAMES OF FAMILY MEMBERS WHO WERE ASSOCIATED WITH THE HOPEWELL CHURCH FOR THE YEARS 1819 THROUGH 1833 Isreal Township, Preble County, Ohio

The Rev. Alexander Porter kept in his notebook a very complete list of the families of his congregation as well as families of his "visitation" as he called them, some of whom may not have been members. It appears from the position of the names on the page of the notebook that the first two names in a family listing are the parents, followed by the names of the children in the order of decreasing ages. Further division of the children seems to be into groups of those above 16 years of age and those below that age. This designation is in shorthand and is not certain, so no attempt has been made to the following copy to make this distinction.

It will be noted in some family listings that two names are given for a person, the last name being different from that of the parents of the family. We can think of three possible explanations for this. In pioneer days the average life span was much less than it is today. As a result there probably were many orphans. At that early time it is not likely that orphanages were easily reached. It would have been the responsibility of relatives, neighbors, or friends to provide for orphaned children until they were old enough to care for themselves. Another possible explanation is the system in use at that time called "indenture" in which the services of a young person, usually an orphan, were sold by his guardian for a fixed number of years to someone who would teach him a trade, or merely benefit from his services. A third explanation is that one or more of the children's grandparents or other relatives were living with the family.

*(NOTE: In most cases, the different "last name" of the child was actually the child's <u>middle</u> name. There are some orphans but they were living with grandparents of the same family name. Live-in relatives are listed last.)

The listing of families and family members is given for several different years, in which there are many dulications of family listings, but in some cases variations in the listings of family names. This makes possible a cross check on the names and the correct spelling of names. It will be noted that the spelling of some names is different from that in use today. Nearly every family had at least one "Eitsy" which we would spell "Betsy" today. The Rev. Porter wrote e and i to look so much alike that in many cases the decision as to which it should be had to be made according to its use in a known word. In some of the "Bitsy" listings the i's were dotted, so we believe that is the correct spelling. His spelling of Elisabeth or Elisa uses s where we now use z. It is probable that some unfamiliar names were spelled according to the way they sounded. It must be remembered that this was a personal notebook, and that the Rev. Porter made notes good enough for his own use, but that he did not expect someone 140 years later to be trying to read them.

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In the following listing of families for several different years, where duplicate listings have been noticed, a cross reference number has been added in parentheses preceding the wife's name. This number is the number of the duplicate family listing from some other year.

Question marks following names in the following list indicate doubt as to what spelling was intended. All spelling is as given in the notebook as far as can be determined. Many entries in the Rev. Porter's notebook are written quite small, and in some cases, the ink is quite faded. A good reading glass was used and was of considerable help in determining some of the names listed.

It is believed that this list of the names of families and family members of those associated with the Hopewell Church in pioneer days will be of great value in the future to those who are trying to trace their family histories back to this time in Preble County. It probably establishes the family names and the names of the children of some of the first families to move to this region. It is probable that no other such list exists. Every precaution should be taken to insure that the original notebook record is preserved for posterity.

*(NOTE: Interchangeable names for women were far more common in the early 19th century. Some were used on tombstones. In addition to our modern "Margaret/Peggy", "Sarah/ Sally" and "Elizabeth/Betty/Betsy", there were: "Jane/Jean", "Mary/Polly", "Martha/Patsy", "Agnes/Nancy", "Jennet/Janet/ Jenny/Ginny", "Isabella/Ibby/Ibley", "Rebecca/Becky" and "Abigail/Abba/Abbie".

"Jane/Jean" and "Agnes/Nancy", in particular, make recordsearching difficult until it is realized that they are true alternate names.)

PREFACE

These baptismal records do not record more than a fraction of the births and baptisms in the large Hopewell congregation. The reasons are unknown. Some families may not have known of the existence of this book. It supercedes a book that listed parents and entire families.

This book was lost for 10-12 years. Some births and baptisms were filled in after the book resurfaced. This book was started after the departure to the new (1834) Fairhaven Church of both Rev. Alexander Porter, retired, and John Pinkerton, long-time clerk of Session and a master record keeper.

The majority of adult Admissions and Dismissals did not move from one area to another but, instead, moved their membership to another "daughter church" which was closer to their homes. These include: Fairhaven A.R.P. (Assoc. Reformed Presby.) Church (1834), Oxford A.R.P. Church (1837) and Unity A.R.P. Church (1849) in College Corner. The Admissions also included brides and grooms of Hopewell members. Some members did not like the new church as well as Old Hopewell and returned. Some families moved their membership to the Morning Sun, formerly Beechwoods, Church.

There is a 12-year gap in the Admissions records; those missing names have been added by taking them from the 1850-1872 Hopewell Sessions Records.

Maiden names, when known, are included in brackets. If any reader can supply more information, please contact me. This is the 1st of many drafts of this book.

I'm seeking the full names of the fathers and the names of the mothers in the baptismal records. I will supply some names in the Index. For instance, all the "James Brown's" weren't the same man, but there is difficulty in distinguishing them.

Any added information would be most helpful in making these Hopewell Church records comprehensive and accurate.

At a meeting held at Hopewell meeting house on the second Friday of August, 1813. Samuel Wilie was chosen chairman. The meeting was constituted with prayer by David McQuiston.

John Patterson, Richard Sloan, Andrew McQuiston, John Wilie and Hugh Patterson were elected a committee to form a Constitution, which was done & was adopted.

John Patterson, Samuel Wilie, John Ramsey, Hugh Mc-Quiston and James Brown were elected Trustees for one year.

A vote was taken & carried that six dollar be laid on each seat for the present year commencing this day to pay (for) supplies* and create a fund for the use of the Congregation. Concluded with prayer by John Patterson.

*"supplies" meant a minister

April 2, 1814

At a meeting held at Hopewell meeting house on the 2nd day of April, 1814 at which time the Rev. Mr. Porter preached, the following subscriptions was taken. We the subscribers of Hopewell Congregation promise to pay the sums annexed to our respective names to be appropriated for the purpose of obtaining the labors of the Rev. Alexander Porter amongst us.

(Herewith follows a list of 50 men and women, all heads of households. The women are all widows.)

HOPEWELL CHURCH "SALERY PAPERS"

These papers are remarkable by their mere existence over 150 years later. Eleven pieces of "plain brown wrapping paper" were laid together, folded and sewed along the folds with needle and thread to make a 22page booklet.

The almost-illegible handwriting compares to other samples of Rev. Alexander Porter's writings. He was the first Hopewell Church minister, 1814-1833. These were probably started as working notes and intended for formal copying later. There are scribbles of arithmetic. Rev. Porter had reason for concern as to whether he would receive his \$500 annual salary as agreed upon in 1814. 2/3's of the salary was to be paid by Hopewell Church. "Salery Papers" is written across the first page.

It is most probable that these notes were never recopied because they do not represent an accurate listing of Heads of Households in the congregation. Much money was collected by John Pinkerton and some others.

John Pinkerton was a trusted and honored collector. He was the Clerk of the Hopewell Church Session, and since no Treasurer was elected or appointed, that was probably one of his duties as Clerk. Mr. Pinkerton was a Justice of the Peace, and later, first Clerk of the School Board and a State Legislator. He accompanied Rev. Porter to Ohio in early-1814 to seek new homes.

For clarity, modern abbreviations will be used: "Sr." for "Sen./Sen'^r/Major", ditto marks instead of "D^O".

An Index for "Salery Papers" will follow at the end of Page 18. Page 19-20 was torn out; Pages 21-22 have only mathematics.

In this particular year, the annual pledge toward the salary of Rev. Alexander Porter averaged about \$2.42 per family.

1830 was a very good year; pledges were high (\$470 toward the \$500 salary) and \$457 were collected-all in cash.

In other years, payments were sometimes made in whatever each family could give in lieu of cash: "weaving, flower (flour), timber", etc. Some years "Paid by Note" was a frequent notation.

Dear Sir and Brother:-

We are enclosing an application, which we will ask you to kindly fill out and mail to us, so that we may submit our insurance proposition. It will cost you nothing to do this, and we hope you will attend to it at once. We can assure you it will be to your advantage to do so.

Approximately 100 families came from South Carolina, or are represented here with certificates. Excluding those from Ohio, South Carolinians comprised about two-thirds of the early congregation.

Many families from Kentucky had come there via South Carolina. Many members of Rev. Alexander Porter's Cedar Springs and Long Cane congregations had come to Hopewell Church in Preble Co., OH, prior to 1814.

September 4, 1814 certainly must have left Rev. Porter with writer's cramp. He signed the majority of certificates that day, including those for his wife and children. Thereafter, the Porters and a large part of his congregation left for Ohio. All certificates are signed as Abbeville DISTRCT.
